

A RESOLUTION OF THE PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BLANCHARD, OKLAHOMA, RECOMMENDING DENIAL OF AN APPLICATION TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL TERRITORY WITHIN THE A-1, AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT; AND TO DELETE SUCH PROPERTY FROM THE S-1, SUBURBAN DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, Carl D. Crowley and Gregory D. Crowley, owners, filed an application requesting a zoning reclassification of land from the S-1, Suburban District to the A-1, Agricultural District on property located at:

The Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SW/4 SE/4 SW/4) of Section Twenty-Five (25), Township Eight (8) North, Range Five (5) West, I.M. Grady County, Oklahoma.

WHEREAS, the Commission held their Public Hearing on said Application at their regular meeting on Thursday, April 8th, 2021 to solicit general input in accordance with Section 21-1012 of the Blanchard Code of Ordinances and Title 11 O.S. Section 43-104; and

WHEREAS, at said hearing, upon considering all testimony and arguments, if any, of all interested persons owning property within a three-hundred (300) foot radius of said parcel, the Commission voted to recommend denial of said Application to A-1, Agricultural District; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission did make the following findings to recommend such denial of said Zoning Application to the City Council:

- <u>NOT Consistent with General Plan</u> The Zoning Reclassification to A-1, Agricultural District to be inconsistent with the goals, objectives and policies of the City's Updated 2020 Comprehensive Plan, as the Future Land Use is classified to be Low-Density Residential, described as Single –Family homes on 1-2.5 acre tracts of land.
- 2. <u>Public Welfare</u> Approval of this Zoning Reclassification to A-1, Agricultural District WOULD create conditions that would be materially detrimental to the public health, safety and general welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Planning Commission of the City of Blanchard, that:

SECTION 1. That the above recitations are true and constitute the Findings of the Planning Commission in this case.

SECTION 2. That the Planning Commission does hereby recommend to the City Council the denial of the Zoning Application for reclassification of property to A-1, Agricultural District.







Background

The subject property is located at the NE intersection of SW 7th St and Eisenhour Ave in the Grady County portion of City Limits. The properties along Eisenhour Ave, including this tract, are not within a platted subdivision like the surrounding properties located within Summerfield III to the East and Oakmont across 7th St to the South. The subject property contains approximately 10 acres of vacant land and is zoned S-1, consistent with the zoning given upon annexation by Ordinance 2004-12. All of the surrounding properties are also zoned S-1.

The reason for the rezoning request on the applications states "to build a church" which is consistent with the intention as described to staff by a potential buyer for the property if successfully rezoned. A-1, Agricultural allows for a "Church, synagogue, or temple, including Sunday School facilities" in Section 21-712 – Table of Permitted Uses in A-1 District of the Zoning Regulations. In the Future Land Use Plan in the 2020 Comprehensive Plan Update, all of the area in this region, including the subject property, calls for Low-Density Residential, which is defined as single family homes on 1-2.5 acre tracts of land.

The property is located more than 300 ft away from water or sanitary sewer services. Eisenhour Ave is a private road while SW 7th St is a Section Line Road maintained by the City.

l | Page Rezoning Report 8 April 2021 There have not been written protests to date, but staff has fielded several phone calls with opposition and concern for the request. Most complaints have shown concern for this being development other than residential on the property. The concerns have also brought up potential issues related to traffic on Eisenhour Ave, which is a private road.

Site Location & Description


The property is located in the SW/4 of Section 25, Township 8 North, Range 5 West of the Indian Meridian, Grady County, Oklahoma.

Public Notification

Pursuant to Municipal Code Section 21-1012, notice to the public hearing was mailed to all owners and residential and commercial owners of property located within a 300' radius of the subject property and published in the Blanchard News prior to the hearing. In addition, a sign was posted upon the property prior to the hearing.

Zoning Code & General Plan Conformance

The current land use of the property is agricultural and undeveloped land (see Page 25, 2020 Comprehensive Plan Update). The Future land use of the subject property is designated Low Density Residential (1-2.5 acre tracts).



Utilities

The subject property is not located within 300 ft from water or sanitary sewer services.

Protest of Application

No written protests have been filed to date. Several phone calls with inquiry and opposition to the proposed rezoning have been taken by the City Planner.

A normal street lite with a wooden pole runs \$7.98 per light per month.





WHEREAS, the Oklahoma Statutes at Title 11 Section 36-101 states that the power of the municipalities include:

The title to streets, roads and public ways within the limits of a municipality which have been dedicated and accepted by the municipal governing body is held by the municipality in trust for public use and enjoyment.

A municipal governing body may, in the manner provided by law:

1. Regulate and control the use of streets, roads and other public ways within the limits of the municipality;

2. Authorize the execution of any and all contracts, easements and permits for the use of roads, streets, and other public ways as the governing body deems to be in the public interest;

3. Establish and change the grade of any street, avenue, lane, alley or other place;

4. Open, straighten, widen, extend or improve any street, avenue, lane, alley or other place by grading, paving, constructing, macadamizing, chatting or graveling, curbing, guttering, draining or otherwise improving the same;

5. Install necessary manholes, catch basins, culverts, inlets and drainage pipes, sewers with necessary connections thereto for the purpose of providing for the adequate disposition of surface water falling on such improvements or carried thereon;

6. Construct, reconstruct, raise, lower, widen or repair sidewalks;

7. Authorize and regulate tunnels, walkways and other structures for public travel under and above public streets and roads; or

8. Make all necessary utility connections whenever the public necessity may require such improvements; and

WHEREAS, the City of Blanchard has the responsibility to maintain 43.29 miles of section line roads; and 46.68 miles of local streets (dedicated and prescriptive) in Blanchard comprising of surfaces that include asphalt, oil and chip, concrete and gravel; and

WHEREAS, a seven (7) member Road Review Committee is recommended to be appointed with the purpose to meet as needed, review and make certain findings and recommendations in regards thereto to the Blanchard City Council; and

WHEREAS, the membership is recommended to be comprised of the appointed individuals as follows:

- 1. a member representative of Ward 1;
- 2. a member representative of Ward 2;
- 3. a member representative of Ward 3;
- 4. a member representative of Ward 4;
- 5. two (2) members representing at-large; and
- 6. the Mayor serving as Chairman; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager, City Planner, City Clerk, Finance Director, and the Public Works Director shall serve as supporting staff to the Road Review Committee; and

These small bodies of water are stocked with fish and managed with special regulations, ensuring opportunities exist for anglers who may only have a little time on their hands and nowhere to go. More importantly, they offer urban dwellers an opportunity to frequently share their fishing heritage with others.

Commonly stocked and caught fish in Close to Home Waters include Bluegill Sunfish, Redear Sunfish, Green Sunfish, Channel Catfish and Largemouth Bass.

By stocking the existing pond located at Crystal Lake Park on a semi-annual basis, this will allow us to offer an annual Fishing Derby to Blanchard kids under the age of 16 which is cosponsored by Walmart and Zebco.

Upon executing an agreement with ODWC, the City will be given 300 fish to initially stock the pond. Another part of the program would entitle the City the opportunities to be involved in grant sharing with the state, providing items to include construction of a fishing dock, fountains (aerator) and fish feeders and other items such as a gazebo, park benches, and a foot bridge.

I have reviewed the proposed Memorandum of Understanding between the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation and the City of Blanchard. I had expressed reservations earlier about the lack of the City's ability to regulate boating, but a second review indicates that Paragraph 10 does allow the city to impose boating restrictions based on the location and lack of launch facilities. That sentence alleviates my earlier concern.

The document that accompanied the MOU is titled "PERKS of signing up with Close to Home Fishing Program" does include some "expectations of" Blanchard that are not identical to the commitments in the MOU. The listed "expectations" in the PERKS sheet that could add unanticipated expense are:

#7 Supply electricity to pond area for aeration and security lighting. In the MOU there is no requirement for installing electrical service.

#11 All facilities need to be ADA compliant. Paragraph 9 of the MOU states that the City will "strive to make all facilities accessible to persons with disabilities."

#8, 9, 12 and 13 will require one or more Ordinances to be adopted.

The FMP may include activities such as fish stockings, the addition of fish habitat structures, fish population surveys, user surveys, purchase of supplies / equipment, and aquatic vegetation control.
- ODWC will fund up to 75% of the total annual cost of approved activities specified in the FMP. This commitment is contingent upon availability of (1) SFR funds and (2) in-kind services contributed by the ______ or (3) funding from outside sources
- 3. ODWC will retain ownership of all real property purchased with SFR funds and may at its discretion, remove and recover such assets should the terms and understandings set forth in this agreement not be fulfilled.
- 4. The _______ will annually commit in-kind resources, including personnel, to conduct routine maintenance on park amenities or activities related to the designated CTHFP waters in accordance with the Fisheries Management Plan (FMP) prepared by both parties. The FMP may include activities such as fish stockings, habitat improvements, fish population surveys, user surveys, purchases of equipment, materials / supplies and minor construction related to the pond(s).
- 5. The ______ will match through eligible in-kind services, a minimum of 25% of the total annual cost of approved activities specified in the FMP. This commitment is contingent upon availability of (1) _______ eligible in-kind services and (2) SFR funds contributed by ODWC or contributions from outside sources.
- 6. The ______ will make available upon request by ODWC copies of invoices and cancelled checks as evidence of purchases charged against the CTHFP.



7. volunteer instructors that assist with fishing clinics on CTHFP waters must be certified by the ODWC and are required to submit volunteer time records to the ODWC. A participation report will be submitted to the Aquatic Resources Education Program Coordinator following events that take place at the pond(s).

- _____ will perform regular maintenance 8. The activities and routine upkeep on CTHFP grounds and facilities. . Minimum maintenance includes mowing, trimming of trees and shrubs, controlling vegetation, litter / trash removal, cleaning restrooms, upkeep of fishing / boat docks and aeration equipment storage. In addition, parking lots, roads, fences, gates and signs should be well maintained.
- 9. The ______ will allow and manage public access to all CTHFP sites. Park curfews will be issued and enforced by the cooperator. Furthermore the program will strive to make all facilities accessible to persons with disabilities. Use fees will not be charged to any boater / angler using the pond.
- 10. Restrictions will not be placed on recreational boaters regarding launching of boats However boating restrictions may be based on size or horsepower ratings. imposed on some waters due to location and lack of launch facilities. A "No wake" rule can be imposed and is recommended..
- 11. Activities or use of facilities that interfere with, conflicts with or discourages use by recreational boaters and anglers, except those activities which from time to time are declared by the as special events, is prohibited on CTHFP waters. Continuation of conflicting uses on CTHFP waters will be sufficient justification for termination of this agreement. The program and facilities will remain open for inspection and compliance reviews at all times by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the ODWC to fulfill responsibilities in monitoring Federal grant projects.
- 12. Major cost reimbursable capital construction projects identified in the FMP, such as boat ramp construction or improvement, launching docks, fishing docks or piers, parking facilities, restrooms, fish cleaning facilities, connecting sidewalks, etc., if



funded, will be initiated under separate Cooperative Agreement between the parties and are not subject to the provisions of this memorandum.

- 13. ODWC and the ______ will hold biannual performance meetings to discuss the status of the CTHFP. Status reports will be prepared by ODWC and a full program review will take place after five years to evaluate the success of the program and assess needs for future contributions by both parties.
- 14. Failure to comply with the terms of this agreement by either party shall allow the other party to withdraw any interest they have at the time and terminate the agreement.



GASB (the Governmental Accounting Standards Board) requires the preparation of annual financial statements of the financial reporting entities of the City of Blanchard to be independent of the City's auditing firm (Angel, Blasingame & Johnston).

Their initial services provided to the City include the following:

- Preparation of Annual Financial Statements
- General Accounting and Advisory Assistance
- Monthly Bank Reconciliations

To ensure that all monies received by the City is properly handled and accounted for, a checks and balance (from an unbiased outside firm) of our financial accounting system is required.

This firm provides an in depth monthly bank reconciliation to insure that all funds are properly handled and accounted for. The firm also assists staff on general accounting and advisory assistance regarding the compliance with Oklahoma law. Crawford and Associates prepares the annual financial statements of the City for independent auditing performed by Angel, Blasingame and Johnston. AGREEMENT FOR LIBRARY SERVICES, FACILITIES AND MAINTENANCE 2021-2022

This Agreement is made and entered into this ______ day of ______, 2021 by and between the Pioneer Library System (**"Pioneer"**) and the City of Blanchard (the **"City"**) to set forth all rights and obligations of the parties with respect to the Blanchard Public Library.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Pioneer is a multi-county library system organized under 65 O.S § 4.101 et seq. operating public libraries in Cleveland, McClain and Pottawatomie Counties; and

WHEREAS, Blanchard has been a member of the library system operated by Pioneer since 1961; and

WHEREAS, Blanchard is located within McClain County (the "County") and the voters of the County have approved ad valorem millage authorized by Art. X, Section 10A of the Oklahoma Constitution to support library services provided by Pioneer, including the 6 mill levy approved May 13, 2008; and

WHEREAS, the City owns real property located at 205 N.E. 10th Street, Blanchard, Oklahoma, upon which the Blanchard Public Library is located; and

WHEREAS, Pioneer has agreed to provide all services necessary to operate the Blanchard Public Library in conformance with the standards promulgated by the Oklahoma Department of Libraries at the site owned by the City (the "Blanchard Public Library"); and

WHEREAS, the City, consistent with its budgetary responsibilities and budgeted funds available, will include estimated appropriations within its 2021-2022 fiscal year budget for all expenses it is obligated to pay in connection with this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to update and refine the delineation of the duties each has assumed with respect to provision of library services for the Blanchard Public Library.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, and upon the conditions, and under the terms stated herein, the parties agree as follows:

A. **Pioneer Library System's Obligations.** Pioneer shall:

1. Provide a collection of materials and programming services at the Blanchard Public Library to meet the information and recreational reading needs of the residents of Cleveland, McClain, and Pottawatomie Counties, including, particularly, the residents of Blanchard, Oklahoma.

2. Provide local and administrative staff to plan and implement library services in accordance with standards promulgated by the Oklahoma Department of Libraries. Said staff shall be employed by Pioneer, not the City of Blanchard. Further, Pioneer's staff shall not be considered to be employees of

the City, and employees of the City shall not be considered to be employees of Pioneer. Pioneer will, in its sole discretion, employ and hire such staff as it deems advisable for the operation of the Blanchard Public Library. All decisions regarding the supervision, compensation, promotion and discharge of such employees shall be made solely by Pioneer. Pioneer hereby agrees to waive any possible claims to any retirement benefits or deferred compensation for its employees and any other benefits available to qualified employees of the City. Pioneer shall maintain worker's compensation insurance for all of its employees working at the Blanchard Public Library in accordance with the applicable law of the State of Oklahoma.

3. Provide trained library staff to implement library services, including but not limited to, reference services, technology and training, reading guidance, library programs and administrative services.

4. Provide a collection of materials to include, but not limited to, both fiction and nonfiction and present the collection in a variety of formats to be determined by Pioneer. The collection will include materials for customers of all ages, including children, teens, and adults.

5. Provide library services, to include but not be limited to, programming determined by library floor space, staff availability and community need.

6. Provide library services to include but not be limited to, sharing of materials among Pioneer, the Blanchard Public Library, and the other branch libraries within the Pioneer System and libraries outside the Pioneer System, and regularly scheduled delivery of library materials and business communications among the Pioneer administrative and branch locations.

7. Pioneer will provide regular, continuous staff training in the areas of library automation systems, reading guidance, reference services, programming and customer service, and other library and community services.

8. Provide electronic systems for circulation and cataloging of materials and for communication among the branch libraries and administrative staff.

9. Establish hours of operation at the Blanchard Public Library in compliance with standards set by the Oklahoma Department of Libraries in consultation with the City.

10. Pioneer shall own all materials and equipment purchased by Pioneer which shall remain the property of Pioneer. Pioneer shall insure the property it owns in such amounts and on such terms as determined by Pioneer and shall maintain liability insurance covering claims in amounts not less than the limits of liability for governmental entities under the Oklahoma Governmental Tort Claims Act. Pioneer shall provide the City with a certificate documenting that it holds personal property insurance and liability insurance as provided herein. Said documentation shall be provided to the City annually upon renewal of this agreement.

11. By December 31 of each year, Pioneer shall provide to the City a list of all building and/or property improvements Pioneer is requesting the City to make. The City may provide funding for said improvements as authorized by budgeted appropriations for said purposes.

12. Provide all technology Pioneer determines to be necessary, including internet access and computers, at no cost to the City to operate and maintain.

13. Provide to the City security monitoring service a list of all Pioneer personnel who will respond to the monitoring service's contact that security might have been breached. If Pioneer determines that it needs a security guard, Pioneer shall pay for that service and pay the costs of operating the video surveillance system at no cost to the City.

14. Make a good faith effort to minimize all operation and maintenance costs to be paid for by the City.

15. Pioneer shall provide notice to the City of any damages to the real and personal property and need for repairs. Any repairs that require immediate action such as, but not limited to, sewer backups, water leaks or roof leaks, require notice to be given to the City within twenty-four (24) hours. For those repairs not requiring immediate action, Pioneer shall provide notice to the City within fourteen (14) days. Pioneer shall have a duty to use reasonable care to discover any damage or need for repairs to the library.

16. Comply with all ordinances of the City, laws of the State of Oklahoma, and laws of the United States of America relating or pertaining in any manner to this Agreement.

B. <u>The City of Blanchard's Obligations</u>.

The City will appoint at least one member to the Pioneer Board of Trustees as provided by Oklahoma Law.

1. The City, consistent with its budgetary responsibilities and dependent upon the availability of budgeted funds, shall provide a suitable building at the Blanchard Public Library in which the library services may be provided in an appropriate, easily accessible location with sufficient paved parking adjacent to the library building, central heat and air conditioning with temperature control, electricity to meet lighting, climate control and technology needs, carpeting and appropriate hard surface flooring, public restrooms, exterior signage and lighting, furnishings and equipment appropriate to building design and library function, and related equipment for security of the facility and patrons. Access to the Building will comply with State and Federal guidelines for handicapped accessibility and safety, as may be amended from time to time. The term "suitable building" as used herein shall mean a building or facility that meets current established guidelines and does not require the City to meet any new or modified requirements established subsequent to the date of this agreement.

2. The City shall be responsible for the monthly utilities and maintenance associated with the building. Maintenance and operations consist of maintaining the interior and exterior of the building, the furnishings which are owned by the City and located inside and outside of the building, the grounds on which the building is located, and the paved parking areas. Utilities, operations and maintenance covered by this Agreement include:

- a. Telephone service including a listing in the local phone directory, but excluding long distance calls
- b. City cable by franchise agreement
- c. Electric service
- d. Lawn/landscaping service
- e. Custodial services
- f. Building maintenance (including all furniture, fixtures and equipment purchased by the City)
- g. Electronic security system and monthly monitoring
- h. Water, sewer, trash service

The City shall consult with Pioneer periodically about the scope and character of these services.

2. The land, building, and the furniture and fixtures purchased by the City shall remain the property of the City. The City shall purchase and maintain in full force and effect suitable insurance policies as follows: all-risk property insurance covering the real and personal property it owns in an amount not less than the replacement cost of the property, and on such terms as determined by the City. The City shall maintain liability insurance covering claims in amounts not less than the limits of liability for governmental entities under the Oklahoma Governmental Tort Claims Act. A schedule of such policies of insurance then in force and effect shall be provided to Pioneer annually upon contract renewal. Additionally, the City shall be responsible for its own negligence in accordance with State law, including but not limited to, the Governmental Tort Claims Act.

3. The City shall, in its complete discretion, make all decisions regarding the need for capital improvements to be made and funds for those purposes. Capital improvements are any improvements made to maintain the facility in the condition it was on the date of this agreement, normal wear and tear excepted. The City shall not be responsible for capital improvements necessitated by "Tenant Misuse". The term "Tenant Misuse" will not include ordinary wear and tear on the premises, but will mean any act that causes damages to the premises or any part thereof and that arises out of uses of the premises not permitted by the terms of this Agreement or that is caused by negligent or willful acts of Pioneer, its employees, agents, contractors, invitees, customers or users.

4. The City reserves the right to conduct non-profit events or meetings of it's choosing on the premises during each year and every year of the term hereof. The City shall consult with Pioneer as to the scheduling of such events or meetings. No events to be sponsored and conducted by the City shall conflict with events scheduled by Pioneer before the City's request for use. The City's use of the premises shall be subject to the rules, regulations, hours of operation and/or policies adopted by Pioneer pertaining to the premises. The City and Pioneer may agree to additional hours of operation for events or meetings upon prior written agreement.

C. <u>Mutual Agreement</u>

The parties to this Agreement understand and agree that the Blanchard Public Library and all furniture, fixtures and equipment purchased by the City shall be owned exclusively by the City.

D. <u>Use of Premises for Purpose Stated</u>

Pioneer covenants that during the term, the premises shall be used primarily for library and educational related purposes as stated above.

E. <u>Redecoration and Remodeling</u>

Pioneer will have the right and privilege, subject to prior written approval of the City, to perform nonstructural redecoration and remodeling, at Pioneer's own cost, to the premises from time-to-time as it will see fit.

F. <u>Non-Discrimination</u>

Pioneer represents and agrees it is Pioneer's policy, and shall remain Pioneer's policy, to operate the Premises so as not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, age, citizenship status, veteran status, or disability, including but not limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

G. <u>Assignment</u>

Pioneer may not assign this agreement, or any portion thereof, or any part of Pioneer's rights hereunder without prior written approval by the City. No additional tenants will be allowed without modification to this Agreement.

H. <u>Destruction of Premises</u>

In the event the premises should be partially destroyed (less than twenty percent (20%) as a result of fire or other casualty, regardless of the cause, then the City will, at its sole cost and expense, promptly, and in any event within thirty (30) days after receipt of insurance proceeds, or within such longer period of time as may be necessary for the City to comply with public competitive bidding laws, commence to build or replace the same in as good condition as prior to such casualty or, if the City is unable to commence such rebuilding or replacement within thirty (30) days then as promptly thereafter as possible. In the event the premises should be substantially (twenty percent (20%) or more) destroyed as a result of fire or other casualty, regardless of the cause, or should it be untenable and unfit for occupancy at any time during the Term of this Agreement, then, the City, subject to availability of sufficient insurance proceeds for such purposes, may, in its complete discretion, build, rebuild or replace the premises.

I. Force Majeure

Failure in performance by either party hereunder shall not be deemed a default or breach hereunder and the non-occurrence of any condition hereunder shall not give rise to any right otherwise provided herein when such failure or non-occurrence is due to war, insurrection; strikes; lock outs; riots; floods; earthquakes; fires; acts of God; acts of the public enemy; epidemics; quarantine restrictions; freight embargoes; lack of transportation; governmental restrictions; unusually severe weather or any other causes beyond control, and without the fault, of the party claiming an extension of time to perform.

J. <u>Term</u>

The term of this agreement shall be July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022, and shall be renewable annually upon the written consent of both parties.

K. <u>Termination for Default</u>

This agreement may be terminated by either party upon sixty (60) days prior written notice should either party fail substantially to perform in accordance with the agreement terms through no fault of the party initiating the termination after due notice and thirty (30) days within which to correct the fault.

L. <u>Termination</u>

This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause upon giving 180 days written notice to the other party.

M. <u>Redelivery of Premises</u>

Pioneer will, at the termination of this Agreement, or any extension thereof, peacefully quit, surrender and deliver up to the City, its successors or assigns, the premises in good condition, with the exception of usual wear and tear.

N. Whole Agreement and Amendments

This written Agreement between the City and Pioneer constitute the entire understanding between the parties and no other documents or oral discussions shall modify this written Agreement. Should it become the desire of both parties to amend this Agreement, such agreement shall be in writing and must be signed by both parties in order to have legal effect.

O. Entire Agreement

It is intended by the parties that this Agreement will supersede, nullify and void any previous agreements, contracts and supplements thereto between the parties herein or their predecessors and interests.

P. <u>Non-Waiver</u>

The failure of either party, at any time or times hereafter, to require strict performance by the other party of any provision of the Agreement will not constitute a waiver or affect or diminish any right

of any party thereafter to demand strict compliance and performance of the Agreement. Any suspension or waiver by the party of a default of any condition under this Agreement will not suspend, constitute a waiver or affect any other default by the other party.

Q. <u>Severability</u>

If any one or more of the covenants, agreements or provisions of this Agreement shall be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the invalidity of such covenants, agreements and provisions shall in no way affect the validity or effectiveness of the reminder of this Agreement and this Agreement shall continue in force to the fullest extent permitted by law.

The Intermodal Transportation Policy Committee (ITPC) has forty-five (45) members and is the single policy group for regional transportation decision making in the OCARTS area. The ITPC voting membership is composed of locally elected officials, state transportation department managers and commissioners, and designees from other local agencies, representing various transportation modes. Each member local government has one vote. Federal aviation, transit, and highway officials are designated as non-voting ITPC members. The primary functions of the ITPC are to provide guidance for multimodal transportation planning and to assure coordination among transportation modes, local government entities, and planning efforts. The Chair of the ITPC is elected from the membership every year for a one-year term. Individual local governing bodies select their representatives to the ITPC. Staff personnel of ACOG have been designated by the ITPC to provide administrative and clerical support to the Committee. The ITPC meets at 1:20 p.m. on the last Thursday of each month in the Board Room of the Association of Central Oklahoma Governments.

Recent municipal elections have created a need to verify and update the designation of representatives to the ITPC. All members of the ITPC must be elected officials from our governing board (as opposed to municipal staff).

Mr. Floyd,

This memo is being written to address an issue regarding delivery and addressing for citizens located along a roughly 780 ft strip of frontage road along W. Veterans Memorial Hwy (U.S. 62). The frontage road, on the East side of U.S. 62 by the Blanchard Mini Storage and where Heidelberg Fireworks sets up each year, also contains a couple of residential homes.



At least one of these citizens have reached out with issues related to delivery of packages and other parcel by companies other than USPS like Amazon, UPS, etc. Their

addresses are in the 500 block of W. Veterans Memorial Hwy, but one could see their issue as the unnamed frontage road doesn't necessarily look like it would share the same addressing with the highway in front of it.

I spoke to John Larsen, Traffic Engineer, at District 3 of the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) on 3/15/2021 where I confirmed that once ODOT constructs frontage roads like this during widening projects, the local municipality becomes responsible for maintenance henceforth. Because of this, Mr. Larsen saw no issue with the City potentially renaming the section of frontage road or coming up with a different solution to help with the addressing issues.

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

9-1-1 Mission Statement

To enhance the quality of life for all citizens within the borders of McClain County by receiving 9-1-1 and other calls for emergency service, by dispatching necessary emergency services in a prompt, courteous, professional, and correct manner, thereby saving lives, protecting property, and maintaining accurate records for user agencies.

Area of service

This agreement between **The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority** and the **City of Blanchard** governs the provision of E 9-1-1 services throughout the incorporated City Limits of Blanchard, Oklahoma.

Initiation of service

The initiation of E9-1-1 service in McClain County is tentatively set for 1-1-03. This date is subject to revision as progress warrants.

Equipment and networking costs

The total costs to the **City of Blanchard** for equipment and the total cost to the **McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority** for monthly networking shall be mutually agreed to before initiation of 9-1-1 service.

The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority will provide:

- All costs associated with the lease/purchase, installation, maintenance, modifications, upgrades, and insurance of E9-1-1 equipment installed in the primary P.S.A.P. (Public Safety Answering Point) in Purcell and required monthly E9-1-1 phone network costs for the primary P.S.A.P;
- 2) The required monthly phone network costs to connect the primary P.S.A.P in Purcell to a secondary answering point in the **City of Blanchard** dispatch center;
- 3) The initial training for City of Blanchard dispatch center employees in the proper use of E 9-1-1 equipment and updates as may be required;
- 4) The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority Coordinator who will provide or arrange for:

*

- a) MSAG database maintenance;
- b) Proper 9-1-1 equipment usage oversight;
- c) Dispatcher 9-1-1 system certification;
- d) Preparation of required reports or documents related to 9-1-1 services or equipment;
- e) Review of 9-1-1 procedural manuals and forms.

5) 9-1-1 Communications Advisory Committee:

The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority has established a 9-1-1 Communications Advisory Committee. The purpose of this committee is to provide operational direction, support, and grievance resolution as may become necessary in the day to day operations of a multi-jurisdictional 9-1-1 communications center. The committee will elect a Chairman and Vice Chairman and hear comments from citizens and participating agencies at regularly scheduled meetings. Meetings will be held in accordance to the Oklahoma Open Meetings Act.

The 9-1-1 Communications Advisory Committee will assist in offering recommendations to provide efficient and effective communication services to all participating agencies. After discussions the committee may vote on any appropriate recommendations/action to be taken. The committee will direct its formal written comments, requests, or instructions to the 9-1-1 Communications Center Coordinator for implementation or dissemination to the communications center staff.

The 9-1-1 Communications Advisory Committee shall be comprised of six members who shall be and serve as follows:

- 1) The Sheriff of McClain County, who shall serve as a member during his tenure as Sheriff of McClain County or his appointee.
- 2) The **Purcell City Manager**, who shall serve as a member during his tenure as City Manager for the city of Purcell, or his appointee.
- 3) The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Coordinator, who shall serve as a member during his tenure as the Trust Coordinator.
- 4) The Manager of the Wadleys EMS or the Manager of the McClain / Grady EMS shall serve on a one year rotational basis.
- 5) A Fire Chief from a McClain County fire department, or his appointee, from an alphabetized list of fire departments participating in the county wide 9-1-1 communication system, on a one year rotational basis.
- 6) The **Blanchard City Manager**, who shall serve as a member during his tenure as City Manager for the City of Blanchard, or his appointee.

The City of Blanchard, Oklahoma will provide:

- Space in the City of Blanchard dispatch center for the installation and operation of a secondary answering point of the McClain County 9-1-1 system, with complete 24-hour access to said equipment;
- All costs associated with the lease/purchase, installation, maintenance, modifications, upgrades, and insurance of said equipment installed in the City of Blanchard dispatch center;
- 3) The employment, and staffing of at least one qualified dispatcher per shift, 24 hours a day 365 days per year, to answer and dispatch incoming 9-1-1 calls for emergency service.

Amendment of Agreement

This agreement may be amended only with the consent of The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority and The City of Blanchard City Council. However, the parties may develop documents of clarification and/or commitment in compliance with this general agreement.

Term of Agreement

This agreement shall be for the period of July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003. This agreement shall automatically renew for successive one (1) year periods, on July 1st of each succeeding year unless written notice is delivered to all parties of intent to not renew at least 60 days prior to the expiration of the current agreement. Upon written notice of non-renewal, the withdrawing party shall continue to be responsible for its share of operational costs until the withdrawal is completed and for the prompt return of equipment it is using that may belong to another agency.

Indemnification

The McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority shall not be liable for any loss, injury, death, or damage to persons which may in any way result from, or arise out of, any act, omission, or negligence of the City of Blanchard or its employees, agents, visitors, or shall result from or be caused by any other thing or matter whether of the same kind as, or of a different kind than, the matters or things above set forth, and the City of Blanchard shall indemnify the McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority against all claims, liability, loss or damage what so ever on account of any such loss, injury, death, or damage.

The City of Blanchard shall not be liable for any loss, injury, death, or damage to persons which may in any way result from, or arise out of, any act, omission, or negligence of the McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority or its employees, agents, visitors, or shall result from or be caused by any other thing or matter whether of the same kind as, or of a different kind than, the matters or things above set forth, and the McClain County 9-1-1 Trust Authority shall indemnify the City of Blanchard against all claims, liability, loss or damage what so ever on account of any such loss, injury, death, or damage.



KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

THAT THIS TRUST INDENTURE is executed this 18th day of September, 2000, by the Board of County Commissioners for McClain County, State of Oklahoma, Trustor, and by Gary Green, James Akin, Bill Johns, Terry Rousey and Harold Harvell, for themselves and their respective successors in office, who shall be known as the Trustees of the MCCLAIN COUNTY 911 TRUST AUTHORITY, for the purpose of providing to the residents of McClain County the highest quality emergency services possible with the shortest response time-possible.

NOW THEREFORE, WITNESSETH:

That in consideration of the payment by the Trustor to the Trustees of the sum of one Dollar (\$1.00), receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, and of the mutual covenants herein set forth, and other valuable considerations, the said Trustees agree to hold, manage, invest, assign, convey and distribute as herein provided, authorized and directed, such property as the Trustor or other persons may from time assign, transfer, ease, convey, give, bequeath, devise or deliver to the Trust herein created or to the Trustees thereof,

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD such property and the proceeds, rents, profits, and increases thereof unto the said Trustees and their duly appointed successors and assigns, but nevertheless in trust, for the use and benefit of the residents of McClain County, Oklahoma, hereinafter referred to collectively as the Beneficiary, and upon the following trusts, terms and conditions herein stated.

ARTICLE I CREATION OF TRUST

The undersigned Trustor hereby creates and establishes a trust for the use and benefit of the Beneficiary, to finance, operate, construct and administer, hold, and/or receive and administer the Trust Estate hereinafter set forth, in the manner provided in this instrument, or in the absence of any applicable provision herein, then in the manner now or hereafter provided in this instrument, or in the absence of any applicable provision herein, then in the manner now or hereafter provided by law, and under the provisions of 60 O.S. 176-180.3, inclusive, as amended, the Oklahoma Trust Act and any other applicable laws of the State of Oklahoma.

The undersigned Trustor hereby contracts with the above named persons and the latter, as individuals and not as holders of public office, do hereby declare and covenant, between themselves and unto the

Trustor, the State of Oklahoma, and the Beneficiary hereinafter described that they and their successors do and will accept the rights, privileges, duties and responsibilities of the office of the Trustee within created Trust.

ARTICLE II

NAME

Å.

The name of this Trust shall be, and the Trustees thereof in their respective fiduciary capacity shall be designated as:

MCCLAIN COUNTY 9-1-1 TRUST AUTHORITY

Under that name the Trustees shall, so far as practical, conduct all business and execute all instruments in writing, and otherwise perform their duties and functions in the execution of this Trust.

B. Any reference to "Trust," "Trustees," or "the Authority" shall mean the said McClain County 911 Trust Authority or the Trustees thereof.

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PURPOSE

The purposes of this Trust, for and on behalf of the Beneficiary as hereinafter described, are:

- A. To provide for the collection of, monitoring and safeguarding of public funds collected to pay for the installation and maintenance of the lines and equipment of 911 emergency phone services of McClain County; to promote, monitor, evaluate and facilitate installation of all related equipment so that it will function in an efficient and reliable manner thereby providing .911 service to McClain County;
- B. To encourage the cooperation of all emergency services, including police; fire and ambulance services, for the efficient response to emergency requests in their area; to encourage the collection and distribution of emergency response information needed for emergency personnel to efficiently respond to any emergency and to assist in preventing errors in response due to operation activities or area distribution of emergency service responses and, thereby, the improvement of services and avoiding of errors; to evaluate the requests for funds and to distribute funds only as they relate to the installation and maintenance of 911 equipment and operational activities directly related to the 911 designated personnel and for public information; to provide for record-keeping by the Trust and for audits of the utilization of the funds provided for 911 services; to provide for the storage of records of the Trust's activities and for such office spaces as may be required for trust meetings; to facilitate 9-1-1 response in McClain County;

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- C. To hold maintain and administer any leasehold rights in and to properties of the Beneficiary demised to the Trustees, and to comply with the terms and conditions of any lease providing said rights; to acquire by lease, purchase or otherwise, and to hold, construct, reconstruct, extend, install, equip, repair, enlarge, remodel, furnish, maintain and operate or otherwise deal with, any and all physical properties, real or personal, improvements, building and other facilities, whether within or without the territorial boundaries of the Beneficiary, which may be helpful, needful or convenient for utilization in executing or promoting the execution of the Trust purposes or any of them, or which may be used ful in promoting the general purposes of the Trust and the specific education of 911 personnel or the public in the Trust area; to lease, rent, furnish, provide, relinquish, sell or otherwise dispose of, or otherwise make provision for, any or all of the Trust purposes of in the event that any such property or facility shall no longer be needful for such purposes;
- D. To provide funds for the costs of financing, acquiring, constructing, installing, equipping, repairing, remodeling, improving, extending, enlarging, maintaining, operating, administering, and disposing of or otherwise dealing with any of the said physical properties and facilities, and for administering the Trust for any or all of the said Trust purposes, and for all other charges, costs and expenses incidental thereto; and in so doing to incur indebtedness, either unsecured or secured by any part or parts of the Trust Estate and/or revenues thereof as allowed by law;
- E. To expend all funds coming into the hands of the Trustees, as revenue or otherwise, in the payment of the said costs and expenses, and in the payment of any indebtedness incurred by the Trustees for the purposes specified herein, and in the payment of any debt or obligation properly chargeable against the Trust Estate, and to distribute the residue and remainder of such funds to the Beneficiary for the payment of all and or any part of the principal and/or interest of any bonded indebtedness of the Beneficiary and/or one or more authorized or proper purposes of the Beneficiary as shall be specified by the Trustees.

IV

DURATION OF THE TRUST

This Trust shall have duration for the term of duration of the Beneficiary and/or until such time as the Trust's purposes shall have been fully executed and fulfilled, or until it shall be terminated as herein provided.

V

TRUST ESTATE

The Trust Estate shall consist of:

A. The funds and property presently in the hands of the Trustees or to be acquired by the Trustees and dedicated or funded by the Trustor and others to be used for Trust purposes;

- B. Any and all leasehold rights demised to the Trustees by the Beneficiary as authorized and empowered by the laws of the State of Oklahoma;
- C. Any and all money, property (real, personal or mixed), rights, chose in action, contracts, leases, privileges, immunities, licenses, franchises, benefits and all other things of value (whether or not above described) presently in or hereafter coming into the hands or control of the Trustees pursuant to the provisions of this Trust Indenture of by virtue of the Trusteeship herein declared or otherwise by the laws of the State of Oklahoma.

VI

TRUSTEES

- The Trustees of this Trust shall be citizens and residents of the Beneficiary. There shall be five Trustees. The terms of office of the original Trustees shall be staggered as follows: Original Trustee Bill Johns shall serve for one year. Original Trustees Gary Green and Terry Raisey shall serve for two years. Original Trustees James Akin and Harold Harvell shall serve for three years. The time period for the Trustee service is to be computed from the day of the creation of the Trust by the Board of County Commissioners of McClain County, State of Oklahoma. Upon expiration of any Trustee's term of office, a successor Trustee to serve a term of five years shall be appointed in the manner hereinafter set forth. Upon the occurrence of a vacancy in the office of Trustee, a successor Trustee shall be appointed to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term of office in the manner hereinafter set forth. All appointments of successor Trustees shall be made by the Board of County Commissioners of McClain County, State of Oklahoma. Each successor Trustee in office so appointed and confirmed shall without any further act, deed or conveyance become a Trustee of this Trust and become fully vested with all of the estate, properties, rights, powers, duties and obligations of his or her predecessor with like effect as if originally named Trustee herein. This Trust shall be effective from and after its execution by a majority of the original Trustees herein designated. Thereafter, any original Trustee may signify his or her acceptance of the office of Trustee by executing this Trust.
- B. The Chairperson of the Trustees shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the Trustees. The Chairperson of the Trustees shall preside at all meetings and perform other duties designated by a majority of the Trustees. The Trustees may select one or more of their members to be a Vice-Chairperson who shall act in the place of the Chairperson during the latter's absence or incapacity to act as Chairperson.
- C. The Trustees may elect annually, by a majority vote of the Trustees, one or more of their members to be a Secretary. The Secretary can be someone who is not a Trustee. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings of the Trustees and shall maintain complete and accurate records of all of their financial transactions, and all such minutes, books and records shall be on file in the office of the Trust. The Trustees may elect Assistant Secretaries who

may or may not be Trustees. The Assistant Secretary or Secretaries shall act in the place of the Secretary during the latter's absence or incapacity to act.

D. The Trustees shall elect a Treasurer of the Trust who may or may not be a Trustee.

E. The Trustees may appoint a general manager for the Trust and may employ such other clerical, professional, legal and technical assistance as may be deemed necessary in the discretion of the Trustees to properly operate the business of the Trust, and may fix their duties, terms of employment and compensation. Any such employee(s) may be a person(s) who is also an employee of McClain County and may receive reasonable compensation from the Trust Estate. All Trustees shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for actual, reasonable expenses incurred in the performance of their duties hereunder. In the event a general manager is appointed by the Trustees, the said general manager shall administer the business of the Trust as directed from time to time by the Trustees.

F. The Trustees are authorized to contract, in connection with the incurring of any fundedindebtedness secured by the Trust Estate and/or its revenues, or any part of either or both, that in the event of a default in the fulfillment of any contract obligation undertaken on behalf of the Trust, or in the payment of any indebtedness incurred on behalf of the Trust, then a temporary trustee or trustees or receiver shall be appointed to succeed to the rights, powers and duties of the Truste then in office. Any such contract, if made, shall set out the terms and conditions under which such a temporary trustee or trustees or receiver shall be appointed to be paid, and provide for the said appointment(s) to be vacated and the permanent Trustees to be automatically reinstated upon the termination of all defaults by which the said appointment(s) was (were) authorized.

G. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness to be issued by the Trustees shall not constitute any indebtedness of the State of Oklahoma, or of the Beneficiary, nor shall they be considered personal obligations of the Trustees of the Trust, payable solely from the Trust Estate.

- H. The Trustees, the State of Oklahoma, and the Beneficiary hereof shall not be charged personally with any liability whatsoever by reason of any act or omission committed or suffered in good faith or in the exercise of their honest discretion in the performance of such Trust, or in their operation of the Trust Estate; but any act or liability for any omission or obligation of the Trustees in the execution of such Trust, or in the operation of the Trust Estate or so much thereof as may be necessary to discharge such liability or obligation.
 - Notwithstanding any other provision of this Indenture which shall appear to provide otherwise, no Trustee or Trustees shall have the power or authority to bind or obligate any other Trustee or the Beneficiary, in his or her or its capacity, nor can the Beneficiary bind or obligate the Trust or any individual Trustee.

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- All Trustees appointed hereunder shall qualify by executing written acceptances of all the terms of this instrument, filed in the office of the clerk of McClain County, and by subscribing and filing such oaths as shall be required by law of public officers of the State of Oklahoma.
- K. The acceptance of the office of Trustee of this Trust shall not constitute any agreement of the Trustees, or any of them, to be in any partnership or association each with the other, but each shall be an individual and wholly independent Trustee only.
- L. All persons, firms, associations, trusteeships, corporations, municipalities, govarnments, and all agents, agencies and instrumentalities thereof, contracting with any Trustee or Trustees shall take notice that all expenses and obligations, and all debts, damages, judgments, decrees or liabilities incurred by any Trustee or Trustees, and any of the foregoing incurred by any officer, agent, servant or employee of any such Trustee or Trustees, in the execution of the purposes of this Trust, whether arising from contract or tort, shall be solely chargeable to and payable out of the Trust Estate. In no event shall any Trustee or the Beneficiary of this Trust in any manner individually liable for any injury or damage to persons or property, or for anybreach of contract or obligation, caused by, arising from, incident to, or growing out of the execution of this Trust, nor shall they, nor shall any of these, be liable for the acts of omission(s) of each other or any other such Trustee; PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing shall not apply to the individual Trustees for any willful or grossly negligent breach of trust of any said Trustee or Trustees.
- M. All of the legal rights, powers and duties of each Trustee shall terminate when he or she shall cease to be a Trustee hereunder and all of such legal rights, powers and duties shall devolve upon his or her successor and successors, with full right and power of the latter to do or perform any act or things which his or her predecessor or any predecessor could have done or performed.

VII

POWERS AND DUTIES OF TRUSTEES

Subject to and in full compliance with all requirements of law applicable to this Trust or to the Trustees thereof:

A. The Trustees, in the manner hereinafter set forth, shall do, or cause to be done, all things which are incidental, necessary, proper or convenient to carry fully into effect the purposes enumerated in Section III of this instrument, with the general authority hereby given being intended to make effective the power of the Trustees under this instrument; and to effectuate the said purpose of the Trustees are specifically authorized to conduct the following activities in a lawful manner (without excluding such other as may be authorized elsewhere in this Indenture or otherwise necessary to perform the required duties of Trustees):

(1) To sue and be sued;

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- (2) To enter into and conduct and execute, apply for, purchase or otherwise acquire franchises, property (real or personal), contracts, leases, rights, privileges, benefits, chose in action, or other things of value, and to pay for the same in cash, with bonds or evidence of indebtedness, or otherwise.
- (3) To own, hold, manage, and in any manner convey, lease, assign, liquidate, dispose of, compromise or realize upon any property, contract, franchise, lease, right, privilege benefit, chose in action, or other thing of value, and to exercise any and all power necessary or convenient with respect to the same.
- (4) To guarantee, acquire, hold, sell, transfer, assign, encumber, dispose of, and deal in the stocks, bonds, debentures, shares or evidences of interest or indebtedness in or of any sovereignty, government, municipality, corporation, association, trusteeship, firm or individual, and to enter into and perform any lawful contract in relation thereto, and to exercise all rights and privileges in relation thereto, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do; and the foregoing shall include (without limitation by reason of enumeration), the power and authority to guarantee or assume, out of the distributive funds of the Trust, the payment of any part or all of the principal of and/or the interest on any bonded indebtedness;
- (5) To enter into, make and perform contracts of every lawful kind or character, including bur not limited to management contracts, with any person, firm, association, corporation, trusteeship, municipality, government, or sovereignty; and, without limit as to amount, to draw, make, accept, endorse, assume, guarantee, discount, execute and issue, promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, acceptances, warrants, bonds, debentures, and any other negotiable or non-negotiable, or transferable of non-transferable, instruments, obligations, and evidences of secured or unsecured indebtedness, and if secured by mortgage, deed of trust, or otherwise, then secured by all or any part or parts of the property of the Trust, and to pledge all or any part of the income of the Trust, in the same manner and to the same extent as a natural person might or could do.
 - To promote contracts of every lawful kind or character, including but not limited to management contracts, with any person, firm, association, corporation, trusteeship, municipality, government or sovereignty; and, without limit as to amount, to draw, make, accept, endorse, assume, guarantee, discount, execute and issue, promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, acceptances, warrants, bonds, debentures, and any other negotiable or non-negotiable, or transferable or non-transferable, instruments, obligations, and evidences of secured or unsecured indebtedness, and if secured by mortgage, deed of trust, or otherwise, then secured by all or any part or parts of the property of the Trust, and to pledge all or any part of the income of the Trust.

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- (7) To exercise all powers authorized by law including such powers as may be authorized by subsequent amendments to such laws.
- B. The Trustees shall collect and receive all property, money, rents and income of all kinds belonging to or due to the Trust Estate, and shall use all of the same solely for the purposes, and the furtherance of the purpose, set forth in Section III of this instrument, and not otherwise. Without limiting the foregoing provisions of this paragraph, none of the net earnings or income derived from or accruing to the Trust Estate, nor any part of the Trust, in any instance beyond that necessary to pay the principal and interest on the indebtedness incurred for purposes set forth in Section III of this instrument and to pay the costs and expenses of the implementation of the said purposes, shall insure to the benefit of any person or entity other than the Beneficiary.
- C. The Trustees shall take and hold title to all property at any time belonging to the Trust in the names of the Trustees or in the name of the Authority and shall have and exercise exclusively the management and control of the same for use and benefit of the Beneficiary as provided herein, in the execution of the purposes of this Trust; and the right of the Trustees to manage, control and administer the said Trust and its property, assets and business shall be absolute and unconditional and free from any direction, control or management by the Beneficiary.
- D. The Trustees may employ such agents, servants and employees as they deem necessary, proper and convenient for the execution of the purposes of this Trust and prescribe their duties and fix their compensation.
- E. The Trustees may contract for the furnishing of any services or the performance of any duties that the Trustees deem necessary, proper or convenient to the execution of the purposes of this Trust, and shall pay for the same as they see fit to provide in such a contract.
- F. The Trustees, by resolution, may divide the duties of the Trustees hereunder, delegating all or any part of such duties to one or another of the Trustees as they deem proper; but where a specific duty is not so delegated, a majority of the Trustees must act for the Authority. The Trustees are hereby authorized to adopt By-Laws and to change the same from time to time at any regular or special meeting of the Trustees. PROVIDED, however, that the notice of any meeting at which an amendment to the By-Laws is to be made shall contain notice that such an amendment will be proposed, and the said notice shall be mailed to all Trustees at least fifteen days prior to the meeting. By-Laws may prescribe notice and quorum requirements for the meetings of the Trustees, the frequency of meetings, the duties of officers and any and all other matters normally prescribed by By-Laws consistent with the provisions of the Trust Indenture.
- G. The Trustees shall, in the name of the Trust hereinabove set forth or in their names as Trustees, bring any suit or action which in their judgement shall be necessary to properly protect the interest of the Trust or to enforce any claim, demand or contract for the Trust or

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for the benefit of the Trust; and they shall defend, in their discretion, any action or proceeding against the Trust or the Trustees of officers, agents, servants or employees thereof; and the Trustees are expressly authorized, in their discretion, to bring, enter, prosecute or defend any action or proceeding in which the Trust shall be interested and to compromise any such action or proceeding, and discharge the same out of the Trust property or assets; and the Trustees also are expressly authorized to pay or transfer out of the Trust property or assets such money or property as shall be required to satisfy any judgement or decree rendered against them as Trustees, or against the Trust, together with all costs, including court costs, counsel and attorneys fees, and also to pay out the Trust, for the purpose of settling, compromising, or adjusting any claim, demand, controversy, action or proceedings, together with all costs and expenses connected therewith; and all such expenditures and transfers shall be treated as proper expenses of executing the purpose of this Trust.

No bond shall be required of the Trustees, or any of them, unless they shall deem the same proper and shall provide therefore by Resolution.

All actions by the Trustees pursuant to the provisions of this Trust Indenture, except for the incurring of debt, as required by law, shall be approved by at least a majority vote of the Trustees. All meetings of the Trustees shall be open to the public; all proceedings of the Trustees shall be in compliance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma and the Trustees shall make or cause to be made a written record of all their proceedings. All books, records and minutes of the Trust and of the meetings of the Trustees shall be considered to be public records and shall be available for inspection by an interested party during customary business hours in the same manner and under the same conditions as are public records of the Beneficiary.

J. At their first meeting Trustees shall designate the principal office of the Trust; and they also shall designate the time and place for regular meetings of the Trustees. The time and place for regular meetings shall not be changed unless at a meeting where all incumbent Trustees are present. No notice shall be required for the holding of regular meetings of the Trustees other than as is otherwise required by law. Special meetings may be held upon such call as shall be fixed by resolution of the Trustees adopted at a meeting where all of the Trustees are present. The Trustees shall cause to be filed, as required by law, a certificate designating the principal office of the Trust and the time and place of regular meetings of the Trustees; and any changes therein shall be filed of record in the like manner. The Trustees shall provide, as required by law, for an independent audit on an annual basis and set a date of the auditor to perform said audit. The Trustees shall in all respects comply with the Open Meeting Act of the statutes of the State of Oklahoma, as amended or changed. Further the Trustees shall in all respects comply with the Oklahoma Open Records Act of the statutes of the State of Oklahoma.

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BENEFICIARY

The term "Beneficiary", as used in this instrument, under and pursuant to 60 Oklahoma Statutes Sections 175-180.3, inclusive, as amended and supplemented, and other statutes of the state of Oklahoma presently in force and effect; shall denote the entity

MCCLAIN COUNTY

State of Oklahoma, and likewise shall denote any county entity which hereafter may succeed said county as the governing authority designated or lying within the county boundaries of said county on the effective date of this instrument.

The Beneficiary shall have no legal claim or right to the Trust Estate, or to any part thereof, against the Trustees or anyone holding under them; nor shall the Beneficiary, as such, have any authority, power or right whatsoever to do or transact any business whatsoever for or on behalf of, or binding upon the Trustees or the Trust Estate; neither shall the Beneficiary have the right to control or direct the actions of the Trustees in respect of the Trust Estate, or any part thereof; nor shall the Beneficiary shall be entitled solely to the benefits of the Trust, as administered by the Trustees hereunder, and at the termination of the Trust, as provided herein, and then only, the Beneficiary shall receive the residue of the Trust Estate. Notwithstanding anything in the aforesaid appearing to be to the contrary, no provision in this instrument and/or of the acceptance of the beneficial interest by the governing body of the Beneficiary limiting, restricting or denying any authority, power or right of the Beneficiary of the said Trust in relation to the administration thereof is intended, nor shall any such be construed or interpreted, to effect a surrender, or to attempt to effect a surrender, of any of the sovereign governmental powers of the State of Oklahoma or of the Beneficiary; but any and all provisions of this Trust instrument are intended, and shall be applied, to relate solely and only to the proprietary rights and property interests of the said Beneficiary, in trust, as distinguished from its sovereign governmental powers and authority. Moreover, it is further agreed that nothing contained in this Trust Indenture and/or in the acceptance of the Beneficial Interest thereunder shall be constructed, interpreted or applied as granting or intending to grant to the Trustees hereunder an exclusive franchise in relation to any powers, rights or authority of the Trustees under this trust instrument.

IX

TERMINATION

A.

This Trust shall be irrevocable by the Trustor and shall terminate:

 When the purposes set forth in Section III of this instrument shall have been fully executed and fulfilled as determined by the Trustees and concurred in by the Board of County Commissioners for McClain County, State of Oklahoma;

- (2) In the event of the happening of any event or circumstance that would prevent the said purposes of this Trust from being executed and fulfilled and if all of the Trustees and the Board of County Commissioners for McClain County, as the elected representatives of the Beneficiary hereunder, with the approval of the Governor of the State of Oklahoma, shall agree that such an event or circumstance has taken place; PROVIDED, however, that all indebtedness of the Trust shall have been paid;
- (3) In the manner provided by 60 O.S. 180, as amended; PROVIDED, however, that all indebtedness of the Trust shall not be terminated by voluntary action if there be any outstanding indebtedness or fixed-term obligations of the Trustees, unless all owners of such indebtedness or obligations, or someone authorized by them to do so, shall have consented in writing to such termination.
- B. Upon termination of this Trust the Trustees shall proceed to wind up the affairs of the Trust and after payment of all debts and obligations of the Trust out of Trust assets, to the extent thereof, shall distribute the residue of the Trust assets, if any there be, to the Beneficiary hereunder as provided in Section III of this instrument. Upon final distribution as aforesaid, the powers, duties and authority of the Trustees hereunder shall cease.

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PARTIAL INEFFECTIVENESS

The invalidity or ineffectiveness for any reason of any one or more words, phrases, clauses, paragraphs, sections or subsections of this instrument shall not affect the remaining portions hereof so long as such remaining portions shall constitute a rational instrument. Any such invalid or ineffective portion was inserted conditionally upon its being valid and effective only, and this instrument shall be construed as though such invalid or ineffective portion had not been inserted herein.

COVENANT

The undersigned Trustees hereby accept the Trust herein created and agree to comply with all the provisions and requirements placed upon them by this Trust Indenture. The provisions hereof shall be binding upon the undersigned, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns;

ITEM: IMPOUNDMENT LOTS

BACKGROUND:

The Mayor sent me a text requesting this item be on the 27th Agenda.

The Oklahoma Administrative Code §595:25-5-1 regulates impound lots and what the City would be required to meet. That is, ALL facilities are required to meet the Code and must be inspected and permitted by the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety.

Very few cities operate their own facility simply because such services are provided by the private sector (ie: wrecker companies). At that point, ALL liability is shouldered by them and NOT the City.

Cities are required to rotate wrecker service and most will NOT deliver to a cityfacility. That's how most wrecker services makes their money is in the storage of impounded vehicles and if not paid, they go thru the legal process in obtaining that vehicle to properly dispose of in order to satisfy that debt.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Cost to construct such facility, maintain and operate such facility and specific liability premiums.

Robert,

Per our discussion about the impound lot idea, I AM 100% opposed to the idea of having one that we are responsible for, for the following reasons.

1. We are liable for any damages or thefts which occur so long as the vehicle is in our care. Tow companies are responsible when it is their impound lots.

2. I'm pretty sure that the insurance company (OMAG) would oppose the idea, or at least heavily suggest against it.

I have been burned by this idea at a previous job as Chief of Police, the Town of Kiefer, who had to settle out of court for theft and damage to a vehicle in our lot because we couldn't effectively secure the vehicles. We had an 8 ft chain link with razor wire and still was considered ineffective.

As for the officer who brought this up at juvenile court, I shall deal with that immediately! As for the dispatcher, I have no idea why she would be getting involved but I will discuss it with her supervisor seeing as impounds are a police matter.

Robert,

I do want to clarify one thing as it relates to coverage for losses that may occur within a impound lot. OMAG has an exclusion in the Municipal Liability Protection Plan (e.g. General Liability) for any loss or damage to property while it is in the care, custody or control of the City. So if City impounds a vehicle and is storing it at a City location, OMAG would not have coverage if that vehicle is damaged while being stored or is stolen. We have a few cities that have their own impound lots and, frankly, a lot of Chiefs like them as many use them as an end around on civil asset forfeiture (if we impound a car, once the impound fees get to a certain level we an seek forfeiture to satisfy the fees). We haven't see hardly any claims coming out of such facilities, but there is one that readily comes to mind out of Durant where a car had been impounded for several years as it went through asset forfeiture. Years after it was seized, a Court ordered the car turned over to the suspect's father. When they came to retrieve the car, the windows had burst out (we think likely due to extreme heat conditions). City got sued and OMAG could not provide a defense or indemnity as it was a claim for damage to property while it was in the care, custody or control of the City. So there is a potential liability exposure under the GTCA that City would not have coverage for. The good news is that there is a \$25,000 maximum cap on such claims under the GTCA.

City Manager Floyd,

It was a pleasure to visit with you this morning. Chris and Dorie are going to take a look at the increased premium question if Blanchard chooses to construct a vehicle impound storage lot. Attached is a regulation found under Title 595 of the Oklahoma Administrative Procedure Code that addresses physical requirement for such a storage facility. We are also taking a look at the liability question to see if there is additional lability beyond the Governmental Tort Claims Act (OGTCA) provisions. OGTCA liability limits have already been worked into the Municipal Liability Protection Plan offered to cities and towns across the state by OMAG.

If Blanchard were to build or acquire such a facility, then underwriting would be happy to assess what additional premium cost would need to be assessed to cover that facility based on valuation of the facility under the Municipal Property Protection Plan offered to cities and towns across the state by OMAG.

With your meeting being next week, I wanted to make sure you were aware of the regulation that deals with physical requirements for a storage facility. We will share more information with you as it becomes available. Hope this is helpful.

Okla. Admin. Code § 595:25-5-1

Section 595:25-5-1 - Physical requirements for storage facility

(a)General Requirements. All wrecker operators, who, in conjunction with or as part of a licensed wrecker operation, store, park or maintain possession of a towed vehicle, shall store such vehicle in a storage facility which shall meet the minimum physical requirements prescribed in this Section. No vehicle shall be stored in any facility or area which has not been inspected and approved by the Department except in case of exceptiona circumstances such as natural disasters or at the direction of law enforcement officers at the scene of an incident.

(1) An operator shall not store vehicles:

(A) At their home,

(B) In another operator's storage lot; or

(C) Any other location unknown to the Department.

(2) The entrance to the storage facility shall be separate from any other business entity.

(3) A vehicle accepted for storage may not be altered without consent of the vehicle owner or their authorized representative.

(4) No stored vehicle may be used for personal or business use without the prior written consent of the vehicle's owner.

(b)Outdoor Storage Facilities.

(1) Every primary outdoor storage facility:

(A) Shall be designed to be minimum of 5000 square feet for small truck and minimum of 15000 square feet for large truck in size. A previously licensed proprietor, partnership or corporation business will be allowed to renew the DPS license for their location unless they are changing locations of business.

(B) Shall be surrounded completely by a fence. Construction material for fences shall be of wood, metal, chain link or masonry and be at least six feet (6') in height built solid, firmly and securely to provide the best protection for restricted access. Livestock paneling (welded wire) shall not be used unless the wire diameter is equal to or larger than 8 gauge (0.160 diameter) with horizontal panels no larger than 4" x 4". T post construction shall not be approved. Outdoor storage facilities, effective July 1, 2014, shall meet new standards or if facilities previous of date, upon a failed inspection, if found the fence did not meet previous standards, new standards will be imposed.

(C) Shall have at least one (1) gate of the same quality of material and height of the fence and must be locked if not attended.

(D) The storage lot area:

(i) Shall be maintained, including but not limited to removal of tall weeds, overgrown vegetation and debris;

(ii) The lot surface shall be an all-weather surface such as concrete, asphalt, blacktop, gravel, or any materials equivalent;

(iii) And cover the complete area of the storage lot that enables the safe and effective movement of storec vehicles upon all portions of the storage lot.

(2) If the construction requirements in paragraph (1) of this subsection are in violation of municipal zoning ordinances or other laws, regulations, or ordinances, the operator may file with the Department a petition for exemption and a proposed security plan in lieu of the requirements, which the Department may approve. The operator shall attach a copy of such zoning ordinance or other laws, regulations, or ordinances with the petition.

(c)Facility Location and Number.

(1) A minimum of one (1) primary storage facility shall be located within a two (2) mile radius of the place o business address as reflected on the wrecker license and, effective January 1, 2005, shall be located within Oklahoma. Secondary storage facilities may be located outside the two (2) mile radius.

(2) Each vehicle stored must be initially stored and held at the primary storage facility. After thirty (30) days from date of initial storage, vehicles may be moved to a secondary storage facility. The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to junk vehicles.

(d)Alternate Primary Storage Facility. In lieu of or in addition to the primary storage facility described in this Section, a wrecker operator that tows a vehicle pursuant to a contract with a municipality or county may store such vehicle in a facility meeting the requirements set forth in such contract; provided, that:

(1) A copy of the proposed contract is furnished to the Department, along with documentation that requirements specified in this Section will be or have been met.

(2) Only vehicles towed at the request of the municipality shall be stored in such facilities unless such facility meets all the requirements of this Section.

(3) The wrecker operator shall have assumed reasonable responsibility with respect to the owner of such towed vehicle for any damages or loss of contents occurring during such time as the towed vehicle is stored in the facility.

(4) If the storage facility is not owned by the operator, the owner of such storage facility shall also assume joint responsibility for damages or loss of contents to the vehicle secured during such time as the vehicle is stored at such facility.

(5) Such storage facility must meet or exceed the requirements of this Section.

(6) If such storage facility is not operated by the operator, the operator shall have made arrangements with the owner of such storage facility to enable the owner of the vehicle to make full payment for towing and storage costs at the storage facility location and thereby obtain full release of the vehicle.

(7) A wrecker operator may not store any vehicle in a facility which has not been inspected and approved by the Department.

(e)Indoor storage facility. An operator may also provide an indoor storage facility as either a primary or secondary storage facility. Due to a special situation such as, but not limited to, a pending fatal collision, asset forfeiture or criminal investigation, law enforcement may select without regard to rotation, an operator nearest to the incident with appropriate indoor storage. The facility must meet the requirements of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol and the operator must comply with any special instructions. An indoor storage facility shall be a permanent structure that meets the following minimum physical requirements.

(1) A solid roof,

(2) A solid hard-surface floor,

(3) Solid walls which fully enclose all sides, i.e. reach from corner to corner on each side and from the floor to the roof on all sides so there is no public access. The walls may be penetrated by windows and doors which must be fully operable so as to make the facility fully enclosed when the windows and doors are closed, and

(4) Must be a minimum of 500 square feet in size.

(f)Each Wrecker Service is a Separate Entity. Each wrecker service shall be licensed as a separate legal entity. Any wrecker service with storage shall maintain a primary storage facility that is physically separated from any other entity's storage facility as determined by the Department, so that the responsibility and accountability of the operator relating to compliance with these rules is maintained.

(g)Shared Storage Prohibited. Shared use of any outdoor or indoor storage facility by two (2) or more wrecker services is not permitted, except as may be determined by the Commissioner.

(h)Leased or rented building, office or storage. Wrecker operators intending to lease or rent any building, office or storage facilities shall file such plan of lease or rent with the Department for approval. Such plan shall be signed and approved by the owner of the property or representative of the owner and be of at least one year in duration and include specific terms therein delineating the responsibility of the operator relating to compliance with the rules of this Chapter and assurance that accountability is maintained.

(i)Accessibility. Any primary storage facility used to store vehicles at the request of law enforcement shall be accessible to the public by way of an all-weather road. This provision shall not apply to primary storage facilities which have been approved prior to July 14, 2003.
