Animal Cruelty Prevention Month



Preventing animal cruelty starts with responsible pet ownership. The month of April is Animal Cruelty Prevention Month. Cruelty may include but not limited to animal *neglect* of unreasonable deprivation of necessary food, care or shelter or *inhumane treatment* includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- Any physical punishment inconsistent with the health of such animal;
- Lack of food or water for more than a twenty-four (24) hour period;
- Knowingly permitting obvious nutritional deficiencies or other evident health problems involving any animal;
- Improper use of any collar or harness or a fixed leash for the purpose of confining any animal which results in flesh laceration, obvious pain or to cause choking to such animal;
- Depriving animal of adequate shelter; and
- Inhumane killing or attempting to kill any animal.

You can report instances of animal cruelty to the City of Blanchard to be investigated by calling 485-9392.

Child Care Guidelines

Effective immediately, child care providers are requested to implement the following guidance, consistent with new requirements in accordance with federal guidance and <u>Governor Kevin Stitt</u> recent disaster declaration:

---Prohibit any person except the following from accessing an operation: operation staff; persons with legal authority to enter, including law enforcement officers, state child care licensing staff, and Department of Human Services' Family and Protective Services staff; professionals providing services to children; children enrolled at the operation; and parents or legal guardians who have children enrolled and present at the operation.

---Require pickup and drop-off of children outside of the operation, unless it's determined that there is a need for the parent to enter an operation.

---Before allowing entry into the operation, screen all individuals listed above, including taking the temperature of each person upon arrival at the operation each day, and deny entry to any person who meets any of the following criteria:

☑ A temperature of 100.4°F or above.

☑ Signs or symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as a cough, shortness of breath, sore throat, and low-grade fever.

☑ In the previous fourteen (14) days has had contact with someone with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19; is under investigation for COVID-19; or is ill with a respiratory illness.

 \square In the previous fourteen (14) days has travelled internationally to countries with widespread, sustained community transmission. For updated information on affected countries, visit the <u>CDC</u>.

Provide each child with individual meals and snacks. Do not serve family style meals.

Easter Sunday

Many Christians celebrate Easter Sunday as the day of Jesus Christ's resurrection, which is written in the New Testament of the Christian bible. According to the Gospel of John in the New Testament, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb where



Jesus was buried and found it empty. An angel told her that Jesus had risen. Christians worldwide have celebrated Easter for centuries.

However, the roots of the Easter holiday's traditions and activities can be traced back to pagan celebrations. The name Easter is believed to come from *Eostara*, the goddess of rebirth. In early times the Feast of Eostara celebrated earth's resurrection and rebirth. Strict Puritans would have nothing to do

with Easter – it was merely a human institution – in the past. Charles I, king of England, declared the day as scriptural as Sunday in 1647 but Parliament contradicted him in print and abolished it with other church festivals.

<u>The Easter date</u> depends on the ecclesiastical approximation of the March equinox. In 325CE the Council of Nicaea decided that the Easter date would be the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the <u>March equinox</u>. Easter is therefore delayed one week if the full moon is on Sunday, which lessens the likelihood of it falling on the same day as the Jewish Passover. Eastern Orthodox churches in many countries such as Greece still figure <u>their Easter date</u> based on the Julian calendar. Easter eggs and the Easter Bunny are both fertility symbols, holdovers from the feast of Eostara. Other symbolic parallels include the pagan joy in the rising sun of spring, which coincides with Christians' joy in the rising Son of God, and the lighting of candles in churches, which corresponds to the pagan bonfires. The symbol of the cross and images of Jesus Christ, through paintings or statues, are remembered on Easter Day. Easter is Sunday, April 12th.

April is 'Fair Housing Month' in Blanchard. National Vietnam War Veterans Day



Two (2) years ago, President Trump signed into law the Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act of 2017, establishing a National Vietnam War Veterans Day that will be observed every March 29th in perpetuity.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. – known as "The Wall" – will again, and always, have a significant role in our nation's

honoring of Vietnam War veterans on March 29th. The Wall is an arresting reminder to more than five (5) million annual visitors of the service and sacrifice of more than 58,000 Americans. There is something haunting, cleansing and healing about this hallowed site, and we encourage every American to experience it.

Oil 'n Gas Complaints

With the increase of oil and gas drilling activities in and around Blanchard, comes an increase in complaints of trucks, noise and odor.

All drilling activities complaints are to be reported directly to the Oklahoma Corporation Commission at 580-255-0103 (Duncan Field Ofc) or <u>http://www.occeweb.com/AspxForms/OGComplaintForm.aspx</u>.

The Oklahoma Supreme Court ruled in November 2018 in Case No. 117,303, Oklahoma Oil & Gas Association (Petitioner) v. The Kingfisher County Commissioners, (Respondents), that clarified "Further, a legal challenge to the reasonableness of a rule or regulation imposed by a municipality, county or other political subdivision concerning road use, traffic, noise and odors incidental to oil and gas operations within their boundaries shall be subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of the Oklahoma Corporation Commission, 52 O.S. Supp. 2015, §137.1."

Trucking complaints (speeding, signs, etc) are to be filed with the Blanchard Police Department at 405-485-9392.

SBA Loan Info

Blanchard Businesses Now Eligible to Apply for SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans

Blanchard businesses affected by the Coronavirus (COVID-19) are now eligible to apply for the SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan. The U.S. Small Business Administration is offering low-interest federal disaster loans for working capital to Oklahoma small businesses suffering substantial economic injury as a result of COVID-19.

Businesses can find the form and eligibility information at <u>https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela/</u>

The funding for the loans will be provided by the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act that was recently signed by President Trump.

To qualify for the program, the state must submit documentation of business losses for at least five (5) businesses per county.

If approved, an SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance declaration will make disaster loans of up to \$2 million available to small businesses and private, nonprofit organizations to help alleviate economic injury caused by COVID-19.

According to the SBA, these loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the impact of COVID-19. The interest rate is 3.75% for small businesses without credit available

elsewhere and 2.75% for nonprofits. Businesses with credit available elsewhere are not eligible for this program.

Commerce also has staff available to assist small businesses with filling out the forms. Senior Assistance

ASCOG gratefully received a check from the Masonic Charity Foundation for \$64,158 at the December meeting of the Oklahoma Association of Regional Councils (OARC). The funds will be used in 2020 to assist those in need who are at least 55 years old residing in ASCOG's 8-county region (Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Grady, Jefferson, McClain, Stephens, and Tillman). Typical types of assistance include funding of up to \$800 for ADA approved ramps, dental work including dentures, hearing aids, wheelchairs, scooters, lift chairs, durable medical equipment, minor home repairs, failing home appliances, heaters, air-conditioners. Vision services including glasses, utility assistance, and emergency medications are also available but at lower maximums. Applicants must submit a completed 2020 Masonic Grant application along with an approved vendor's estimate to be considered. Applications will be emailed to all city and county clerks where they can print a copy upon request. Printed versions will be available at the Senior Centers. Applications are also available on ASCOG's website www.ascog.org. Those with email capabilities can request an application be directly emailed to them by emailing ward_ro@ascog.org. Applications are not mailed out. Money that would be spent on postage, envelopes, printing, and labor are reserved for actual assistance as listed above.

Shelter Registration

The Blanchard Emergency Management would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that severe storm season is fast approaching. We want to express how important it is for everyone to register their home's storm shelters and safe rooms.



The City of Blanchard storm shelter registry provides emergency services with information that allows them to locate citizens after a tornado or other natural disaster. Registration helps ensure that people in shelters affected by the storm are able to get help quickly with the potential of shelters' exits being blocked due to debris or structural damage. Registration is doubly important with the possibility of shelters flooding due to broken water lines or simply rain waters entering the shelter and drowning people trapped inside. Registration forms include your address, list of persons who would normally be present at the home and could potentially be in the shelter, the location of the shelter/safe room on the property, and contact information for yourself and an emergency contact. If you have previously registered and some part of your information has changed, feel free to submit an updated form. If you have a question as to if your shelter is registered please contact the Emergency Management Director/Fire Chief Charlie Largent at the Blanchard Fire Department at 405.485.3939.

Sprinkler Checkup

Conserve water and lower your utility bill by checking your yard sprinkler system for any damage from the winter freezing weather.

Turn on your sprinkler system and walk thru each zone;

Flag any broken pipes or heads for immediate repair;

Make sure sprinkler heads isn't spraying water on hard surfaces such as driveways, sidewalks or the street.

Transfer Site

<u>Citizen Collection Center and Operations</u>

The City of Blanchard operates a collection site for the benefit of citizens of the City of Blanchard and nearby rural areas with Blanchard addresses, to dispose of household waste and limited other items. The following policies are current to ensure that the site is maintained in accordance with Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations, and with the City's contract with Waste Connections of Oklahoma, Incorporated.

Permits for the Citizen Collection Center are available 'free of charge' for any residence with a Blanchard address. The cost for bulky waste curbside collection is included in their bill for solid waste service. For rural residents outside the city limits, a standard monthly charge of \$13.75 is charged with a Blanchard address and trash service thru Waste Connections. Permits are available at the Blanchard City Hall. Permits are non-transferable.

Hours of Operation

Monday through Friday: 3:30 pm to 6.00 pm

Saturday: 8 am to 12 pm

Operator Responsibilities

The operator of the Citizen Collection Center has the authority and discretion to accept or reject waste to be disposed of at the site for the following circumstances:

- The materials are not acceptable, per these policies
- Adequate space is not available for the materials to be deposited
- Adequate space may not remain for other household trash to be accepted before the receptacles are replaced by Waste Connections

Households which rely solely upon the Citizen Collection Center have priority to the space within the receptacles over those who are served by curbside trash

service. The operator has the sole discretion to determine whether items may
be disposed, and that decision is final.
<u>Accepted Waste Materials</u>
Any materials to be accepted shall be placed by the individual wishing to dispose
of the materials into the appropriate receptacles provided. Loose materials will
not be picked up.
The Citizen Collection Center will accept the following materials:
 Household waste-bagged
 Carpet cut into strips no greater than four (4) feet in any direction
• Furniture
 Cardboard boxes – broken down
 Mattresses
 Fencing, metal, or other like materials – panels no more than four (4) feet
by six (6) feet
 All non-contracted remodeling waste must be bagged.
 Other waste no larger than what will fit in a yard garbage bag
Bags of Leaves
Unacceptable Waste Materials
Under NO circumstances will the City of Blanchard accept any of the following
materials:
Appliances containing Freon
 Automotive frames or parts; including, but not limited to:
» Batteries
» Brake fluid
» Crankcases
» Engine cleaners
» Motor oils
» Tires and rims
» Transmissions
» Chemicals; including, but not limited to:
Pool chemicals
Pesticides
Rust remover
Commercial waste of any description
 Construction, reconstruction, demolition, and repair waste; including, but
not limited to:
» Bricks, dirt, and rocks
» Roofing materials
» Sheetrock
• Explosives

- Fertilizer
- Fiberglass
- Hospital or medical waste

- Hazardous liquids; including, but not limited to:
 - » Acids and caustics
 - » Antifreeze
 - » Degreasers
- Lubricants
 - » Oils
 - » Poisons
 - » Sewage and liquid waste
 - » Gasoline, kerosene, and other fuels
- Nuclear material
- Propane tanks
- Yard waste; including, but not limited to:
 - » Branches and limbs larger than 4-inches in diameter)
 - » Leaves (unless bagged)
 - » Trees (greater than 4-inches in diameter)
 - » Grass clippings (unless bagged)

• Any load larger than the size of a standard pickup truck bed. The operator has the sole discretion to determine the acceptable load size, and to refuse service of loads larger than the acceptable level.

• No waste from any commercial business shall be accepted at the Citizen Collection Center for any reason.

Trash Service

The City contracts with Waste Connections for solid waste collection and disposal of residential trash. For a smooth operation, the following rules should be adhered to: \int Cans need to be set out by 7am;

- \int Carts need to be by the road, at the edge of the driveways, not in the driveway;
- \checkmark If you have multiple carts they need to be 3 feet apart;
- ✓ Carts need to be 5 to 7 feet from mailbox, cars, etc;

 \boldsymbol{J} If carts are placed with wheels toward the house they are less likely to blow over;

✓ No bungee cords, straps, or rope to be placed on your cart, if it is windy, you can place a rock or brick on the lid to keep it closed;

✓ No limbs or trees or hazardous materials in either polycart.

Trees

Trees are a primary cause of outages and blinks which can disrupt your service from PSO or OEC, so it's important to plant them a safe distance from power lines and buildings. Plant the right tree in the right place and help keep everyone's lights on.



RIGHT TREE, RIGHT PLACE! Short, flowering trees don't clash with overhead utility lines. Large deciduous trees on the

southeast, southwest, and west provide cooling shade in the summer but don't obstruct the warming winter sunlight. An evergreen windbreak to the north blocks cold winds in winter.

BE COUNTED! It's easy! It's safe! It's important! For the first time ever, the Census Bureau will accept responses on-line, but you can still respond by phone or mail.

You may be contacted by phone or in person, please remember that anyone with the Census will NOT ask for your social security number, banking information, money donations, or political parties. If anyone contacts you claiming to be with the Census and asks for any of this information, it is scam! You need to contact the police department immediately. DO NOT give out your personal/financial information.
