### CARES Reimbursement

The City has received a reimbursement in the amount of \$2,704.49 for COVID expenses.

The State of Oklahoma has allocated a pro-rata share of \$77.08 per capita to cities and counties. The allocation set aside is not a guarantee of payment. All reimbursements made to cities and counties eligibility must meet requirements and provide proper documentation. Furthermore, all cities and counties that wish to receive funds must complete a Risk Assessment Survery no later than September 15, 2020. Reimbursement requests can be filed up to November 1, 2020.

The amount allocated to Blanchard is \$686,553.57.

## **CDBG** Application

Our application for CDBG grant funding in the amount of \$250,000 was denied by the Oklahoma Department of Commerce this week. We had problems in obtaining enough income surveys to qualify for funding this year.

The next round of funding opportunity will begin in December with public hearings and adoption of resolutions, etc.

## Hotel-Motel Tax

A question for or against a proposed hotel-motel tax for Blanchard will be on the General Election Tuesday, on November 3rd

Lodging taxes have become more the "norm" than the exception in most large cities and towns statewide, especially in the OKC and Tulsa metropolitan areas. Blanchard residents pay lodging taxes to enhance the local economies in places like Bethany, Del City, Edmond, El Reno, Guthrie, Midwest City, Moore, Mustang, Norman, Oklahoma City and Yukon when lodging at any hotel in those communities. Blanchard does not currently have a lodging tax.

The City is recruiting hotels and motels to locate in Blanchard. Part of the pro forma calculations is the amount lodging tax charged in a community. This determines the feasibility of a hotelmotel, rates and number of rooms.

#### Mandatory Water Restrictions

Due to an increase in water usage, Blanchard citizens are experiencing low water pressure and/or NO water at all.

Blanchard and Central Oklahoma is in a dry to moderate drought due to the extreme lack of rain in June. The City is experiencing a massive increase in water usage 31,000,000 (over gallons purchased from OKC). This increase has had a negative impact on our system's water pressure.

Therefore, a mandatory odd/even watering (Stage 1) is in effect until further notice.

### National Airborne Day



August 16<sup>th</sup> is a day designated by the <u>United States</u> <u>Congress</u> to honor the nation's airborne units of the armed forces. It was created in 2001 by President <u>George W. Bush</u>. August 16, 1940

marked the first official Army parachute jump, validating the innovative concept of inserting United States ground combat forces behind a battle line by parachute. During World War II, airborne tactics were critical to the success of important missions, including the D-Day invasion at Normandy, the Battle of the Bulge, the invasion of Southern France, and many others. In Korea and Vietnam, airborne soldiers played a critical combat role, as well as in later conflicts and peacekeeping operations, including Panama, Grenada, Desert Storm, Haiti, Somalia, and the Balkans. Most recently, airborne forces were vital to liberating the people of Afghanistan from the repressive and violent Taliban regime; and these soldiers continue to serve proudly around the world in the global coalition against terrorism.

The elite airborne ranks include prestigious groups such as the 82nd Airborne Division, "America's Guard of Honor," and the "Screaming Eagles" of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault). Paratroopers in the Army's XVIII Airborne Corps, the 75th Infantry (Ranger) Regiment and other Special Forces units conduct swift and effective operations in defense of peace and freedom.

Airborne combat continues to be driven by the bravery and daring spirit of sky soldiers. Often called into action with little notice, these forces have earned an enduring reputation for dedication, excellence, and honor. All citizens are encouraged to recognize the contributions of these courageous soldiers to our Nation and the world.

## Permits Required

Residents may experience an increase in door-to-door sales associates. If you do encounter a solicitor at your door, they are required to have a permit from the City of Blanchard. These permits are required because they allow the City to perform background checks on applicants, which then allows the City to approve or deny the permit request. Not only are solicitors required to carry the permit on them at all times, they are also restricted to go door-to-door from 9 8 p.m., Monday through a.m. to Saturday. Residents who wish to have no interaction with solicitors are asked to display "No Solicitation Allowed" or "No Peddlers Allowed" sign that can be easily visible. If you suspect that a person in your neighborhood is soliciting without a permit, please call the Blanchard Police Department at 405.485.9391.

### Permit Revocation

An administrative hearing was held on Wednesday, August 5<sup>th</sup>, to determine if the conduct of the solicitor violated City Codes. The hearing was attended by the solicitor and 1-complainant. Two (2) others submitted their protests writing.

After receiving input from the solicitor and the complainant and answering certain questions, it was determined to revoke the license. The solicitor has five (5) days from the date of the hearing to file a written appeal to the City Council.



If you are a senior adult in need who is not already on the delivery list (currently about 50 residents), can call the Center at 485.9260 to be added to the list.

The Center will remain closed until the Pandemic is declared over and all restrictions for vulnerable populations are lifted. Even after restrictions are lifted, new policies for keeping everyone healthy will stay in effect. However, curbside pickup and home delivery will still be provided until then.

# Tall Grass & Weeds

The City of Blanchard is committed to maintaining clean and attractive residential neighborhoods. To help accomplish this goal, the City of Blanchard has adopted regulations concerning the abatement of tall grass, weeds and trash.

The City of Blanchard Municipal Code concerning public nuisances and property enhancement requires that owners or responsible persons of property located within the municipal city limits are prohibited from allowing debris, junk, waste or trash to accumulate, or weeds or tall grass over twelve (12") inches in height, dead trees, bushes, and shrubs to grow or stand upon the premises. This regulation is based upon the Oklahoma State Law Title 11, Section 22-111 which sets forth the procedure and definitions for the cleaning and mowing of property.

#### 2020 SALES TAX HOLIDAY



Oklahoma's annual sales tax holiday will begin at 12:01 am on Friday, August 7, 2020 and end at Twelve Midnight on

Sunday, August 9, 2020. Certain clothing and shoe purchases are exempt from sales tax for this time period only. Qualified items are exempt from state, city, county and local municipal sales taxes.

Retailers are required to participate and may not collect state and local sales or use tax on most footwear and clothing that are sold for less than \$100 during the holiday.


