Animal Control

There has been a recent increase in the number of barking dog complaints.

Therefore, the Blanchard Municipal Court has set forth the following policy:

1. After the initial complaint, the owner of the premises where the animal is located will receive a letter from the City of Blanchard Control stating Animal that complaints of a barking animal has been received alleging that the barking was creating a nuisance and pursuant to Section 101(30)(e) of the Blanchard Code of Ordinances, any dog that engages in loud, frequent habitual barking, howling, yelping or other noise or action that disturbs

any person or neighborhood within the city limits is defined as a Nuisance Dog;

- 2. On a subsequent complaint regarding events that occurred after the owner of the premises had received the ACO's letter, the owner of the premises shall receive a formal written warning from the ACO for a violation of Section 12-302 and attaching to the formal written warning a copy of the letter previously served on the property owner.
- 3. On a subsequent complaint regarding events the occurred after the owner of the premises had received the ACO's formal written warning, a Citation for a violation of Section 12-302 will be issued.
- 4. On a subsequent complaint regarding events that occurred after the Citation had been issued and served, the City Manager and City Council may proceed with formal abatement of the nuisance pursuant to Section 12-303 and after an Order of Abatement is issued, a new citation may be issued each day that the nuisance is allowed to continue.

Ballot Questions



Voters will consider the following two (2) state questions on the upcoming General Election Ballot. They are as follows:

STATE QUESTION NO. 805: This measure seeks to add a new Article II-A to the Oklahoma Constitution. This new Article excepts and does not apply to persons who have ever been convicted of a violent felony. It would prohibit the use of a former felony conviction to increase the statutorily allowable base range of punishment for α person subsequently convicted of a felony. **Individuals** who are currently incarcerated for felony sentences that were enhanced based on one or more former felony convictions, and whose sentences are greater than the maximum sentence that may currently be imposed for such felonies, may seek sentence modification in court. The new Article sets forth a detailed process for such sentence modification, including but not limited to requirements for a hearing, appointment of counsel for indigent petitioners, and notification of victims, and requires that the court impose a modified sentence no greater than the current maximum sentence which may be

same felony with no former felony convictions, and which results in no greater time served in prison than under the original sentence. It establishes an appeal procedure, provides an effective date, and contains a severability clause. NO. QUESTION STATE This measure seeks to amend Article 10. Section 40 of the Oklahoma Constitution (Section 40), which directs proceeds from the State's settlements with or judgments against tobacco companies. Currently, Section 40 directs 75% of proceeds to the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust Fund (TSET Fund), where earnings may only be used for tobacco prevention programs, cancer research, and other such programs to maintain or improve the health of Oklahomans. Meanwhile, the remaining 25% of proceeds are directed to a separate fund for the Legislature (Legislative Fund). The Legislature can also direct some of that 25% to the Attorney General.

This measure amends Section 40 to reduce the percentage of proceeds that go into the TSET Fund from 75% to 25%. As a result, the remaining 75% will go to the Legislative Fund and the Legislature may continue to direct a portion to the Attorney General. The measure would also restrict the use of the Legislative Fund. Section 40 currently states only

that the Legislative Fund is subject to legislative appropriation. If this measure passes, money from the Legislative Fund must be used to get federal matching funds for Oklahoma's Medicaid Program.

- * Tree limbs over hanging the street with less than 8 foot clearance.
- * Failure to trim trees, grass and weeds in alleys.
- Leaving grass in the street after mowing.

Credit for Daylite Saving Time belongs to Benjamin Franklin, who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revised in 1907. when William Willett. Englishman, proposed a similar system in the pamphlet 'The Waste of Daylight'. The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War 1.

The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918.

The Ballot will read exactly as it is shown in the City Resolution as published in the Blanchard News.

Permits Required

Residents may experience an increase in door-to-door sales associates. If you do encounter a solicitor at your door, they are required to have a permit from the City of Blanchard. These permits are required because they allow the City to perform background checks on applicants, which then allows the City to approve or deny the permit request. Not only are solicitors required to carry the permit on them at all times, they are also restricted to go door-to-door from 9 8 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Residents who wish to have no interaction with solicitors are asked to display "No Solicitation Allowed" or "No Peddlers Allowed" sign that can be easily visible. If you suspect that a person in your neighborhood is soliciting without a permit, please call the Blanchard Police Department at 405.485.9391.

Tall Grass & Weeds

The City of Blanchard is committed to attractive maintaining clean and residential neighborhoods. To help accomplish this goal, the City adopted Blanchard regulations has concerning the abatement of tall grass, weeds and trash.

The City of Blanchard Municipal Code concerning public nuisances and property

enhancement requires that owners or responsible persons of property located within the municipal city limits are prohibited from allowing debris, junk, waste or trash to accumulate, or weeds or tall grass over twelve (12") inches in height, dead trees, bushes, and shrubs to grow or stand upon the premises. This regulation is based upon the Oklahoma State Law Title 11, Section 22-111 which sets forth the procedure and definitions for the cleaning and mowing of property.
