Shop Local

Christmas season is rapidly approaching. Here's what happens when you "shop local."

- 1. More of your money will be kept in the Blanchard economy: For every \$100 you spend at a locally owned businesses, \$68 will stay in Blanchard. What happens when you spend that same \$100 at a national chain? Only \$43 stays in the community.*
- 2. You embrace what makes Blanchard unique: You wouldn't want your house to look like everyone else's in the U.S. So why would you want your community to look that way?
- 3. You create local jobs: Local businesses are better at creating higher-paying jobs for your neighbors. When you

shop locally, you help create jobs for teachers, firemen, police officers, and many other essential professions.

Thanksgiving

Our modern Turkey Day has its origins in



two very different holidays: the harvest home feast and the formal day of thanksgiving proclaimed

by church or government authorities in gratitude for a particular event, such as a military victory. Very few days of thanksgiving coincided with harvest celebrations. Thanksgiving Day began in Plymouth Colony in 1621, when the

Pilgrims gave thanks for their survival and a good first crop.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln set aside the last Thursday in November for a national celebration of Thanksgiving. (In 1941, the U.S. Congress decreed that Thanksgiving should fall on the fourth Thursday of November.)

Roast turkey, stuffing, cranberry sauce, vegetables, and pumpkin pie were the main dishes of the New England harvest home feast and became popular because of their supposed connection to the Pilgrims.

Veterans Day

Known as Armistice Day, commemorating the signing of the agreement that ended World War I at 11:00am, on November



11, 1918, this federal holiday was changed to Veterans Day in 1954 by Congress.

At that time, it became a day to honor all the men and women who have served in the armed forces of the United States. Each year, special ceremonies are held around the nation honoring our Veterans.
