Carbon-monoxide Warning

Due to the upcoming extreme cold and power outages, please be aware of the hazards of the following types of heating:

- Never use gas grills, propane grills, charcoal grills in a house, garage or enclosed area;
- ◆ All gas fire heaters MUST be vented to the outside to remove carbon monoxide from an enclosed area; and
- ◆ Please read and follow all manufacturer instructions for any heater.

Debris Removal Update

Contracts with T.F.R. Enterprises, Inc. have been executed for the storm debris pickup from the public right-of-way. ONLY storm debris will be picked up, NO household trash, NO construction material, and NO bags of leaves.

The contractor plans to mobilize on Monday, December 28th, 2020.

Major Disaster Declaration

President Trump signed the Federal Disaster Declaration approving the Oklahoma's request for disaster assistance for thirteen (13) counties related to the ice storm that began on October 26.

The declaration delivers public assistance to municipalities, counties, tribes and rural electric cooperatives for debris removal, infrastructure repairs and other costs associated with responding to the storm.

The counties included in this declaration are Caddo, Canadian, Cleveland, Dewey, Grady, Kingfisher, Kiowa, Logal, Noble, Oklahoma, Payne, Pottawatomie, and Roger Mills.

The multi-storm system produced up to two (2) inches of ice in some areas, left hundreds of thousands without power and caused millions of dollars in damages. In these 13 counties alone, the storm resulted in an estimated \$27million in debris removal and other damages.

Following the governor's disaster declaration request last month, the state has continued to document damages and

will submit a request to add sixteen (16) additional counties to the declaration. Counties that will be included in the addon request are Alfalfa, Blaine, Comanche, Custer, Ellis, Garfield, Grant, Jackson, Kay, Lincoln, Major, McClain, Pawnee, Stephens, Tillman, and Washita.

Postal Rate Increase



The 2020 First Class Package rates aren't seeing as substantial an increase, but will go up an average of 2.2 percent. First Class

International rates will increase by an average of 9.9 percent, a substantial increase compared to 3.9 percent in 2019.

Public Comments

Each year, the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation proposes changes in the administrative rules that govern hunting and fishing in Oklahoma, and this year's public comment period will continue thru January 8th.

Many proposed changes are simple housekeeping matters, but some may be more substantial. For example, new aggregate bag limits for trout have been proposed, and various changes have been proposed for hunting season dates, open hours and bag limits in wildlife management areas. Members of the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission are expected to consider proposed changes at their regular meeting set for February 1, 2021.
