Mandatory Water Restrictions

Due to an increase in water usage, Blanchard citizens are experiencing low water pressure and/or NO water at all.

Blanchard and Central Oklahoma is in a dry to moderate drought due to the extreme lack of rain in June. The City is experiencing a massive increase in water usage (over 31,000,000 gallons

purchased from OKC). This increase has had a negative impact on our system's water pressure.

Therefore, a mandatory odd/even watering (Stage 1) has been implemented and will stay in effect until further notice.

Permits Required

Residents may experience an increase in door-to-door sales associates. If you do encounter a solicitor at your door, they are required to have a permit from the City of Blanchard. These permits are required because they allow the City to perform background checks on applicants, which then allows the City to approve or deny the permit request. Not only are solicitors required to carry the permit on them at all times, they are also restricted to go door-to-door from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Residents who wish to have no interaction with solicitors are asked to display "No Solicitation Allowed" or "No Peddlers Allowed" sign that can be easily

visible. If you suspect that a person in your neighborhood is soliciting without a permit, please call the Blanchard Police Department at 405.485.9391.

Tall Grass & Weeds

The City of Blanchard is committed to maintaining clean and attractive residential neighborhoods. To help accomplish this goal, the City of Blanchard has adopted regulations

concerning the abatement of tall grass, weeds and trash.

The City of Blanchard Municipal Code concerning public nuisances and property enhancement requires that owners or responsible persons of property located within the municipal city limits are prohibited from allowing debris, junk, waste or trash to accumulate, or weeds or tall grass over twelve (12") inches in height, dead trees, bushes, and shrubs to grow or stand upon the premises. This regulation is based upon the Oklahoma State Law Title 11, Section 22-111 which sets forth the procedure and definitions for the cleaning and mowing of property.

2020 SALES TAX HOLIDAY



Oklahoma's annual sales tax holiday will begin at 12:01 am on Friday, August 7, 2020 and end at Twelve Midnight on Sunday, August 9, 2020. Certain clothing

and shoe purchases are exempt from sales tax for this time period only. Qualified items are exempt from state, city, county and local municipal sales taxes.

Retailers are required to participate and may not collect state and local sales or use tax on most footwear and clothing that are sold for less than \$100 during the holiday.

Have you filled out your 2020 Census? It's happening now! Do your part to make sure Blanchard is counted. If you misplaced your mailer, you can still complete the questionnaire at my2020census.gov or call (800)330.2020 any time between 6a.m. and 1a.m. It's important to include everyone who was living in your house on April 1, even if they are or were only temporarily living with you. The Census is the once-in-a-decade count of every living person in America. It counts everyone, regardless of citizenship and the government is

required by law to protect your personal information.

Experts estimate each person who isn't counted in the census costs our community about \$1,675 in local federal funding per person every year for ten (10) years. This means if only half of the citizens of Blanchard responded, then we stand to lose \$64,236,250 over the 10 year period.

Water Solutions

The City of Blanchard is studying three (3) possible options to add a new water supply to serve Blanchard:

1. Winter Creek Water Supply;
2. Rush Springs Aquifer; and
3. Second line from OKC via City of Newcastle.

In the meantime, the City is under a mandatory odd/even outside watering schedule until further notice.

OKC requires Blanchard to follow an odd/even outdoor watering restriction as part of our agreement in purchasing water from the City of Oklahoma City.
