BMIA Action

The Board of Trustees of the Blanchard Municipal Improvement Authority met in regular session on Tuesday, December 14th and discussed, considered and took appropriate action, on the following agenda items:

• APPROVED Consent Order No. 21-233 dtd 12/6/21 issued by DEQ; and payment of a cash penalty of \$6,000.00 SUBJECT to the City Attorney's review;

• APPROVED the purchase of AMR meters and MXU units for water service of \$34,900.

• APPROVED the Consent Agenda.

CDBG Grant

The Oklahoma Department of Commerce (ODOC) approved the release of Funds yesterday for our application CDBG-W/S Construction-2021 BLANCHARD CI-00024. This grant provides matching funds to begin the first phase in the process of upgrading our municipal water lines (less than 6-inch) serving old Town of Blanchard.

The City plans on advertising bids for construction after the 1st of the year due to the holidays.

In addition, part of the administration of this federal funded project is the requirement to advertise job opportunities (the final determination rests with the successful bidder) and wage determination when the project begins in spring.

Gradually, to conform more closely to the liturgical year of the Christian church, the Quarter Days became identified with the church's high seasonal festivals, which occurred close to the astronomical dates. Christmas, the fourth Quarter Day, was both the culmination of the old year and the first festival of the new year. The day originated as a solstice festival and signaled a time of resting and gathering fertility for a new round of sowing and reaping. This festival merged easily with the Christian celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, which occurred at this time of year.

In Scotland, December 31st is known as Hogmanay, the word children use to ask for their traditional present of

an oatmeal cake (which is why this is also called Cake Day). The first person to cross the threshold into your home, called the first footer, is an indication of the year to come. Although the tradition varies, if the first footer is tall and dark, the year will be a good one.

To celebrate, the City allows the discharge of fireworks on Friday, December 31st from 12:00 Noon to 12:00 Midnite; and on Saturday, January 1st from 12:01 am to 12:30 am.

Oil 'n Gas

The Oklahoma Corporation Commission reported since December 10th that NO oil wells were completed or permitted within the municipal limits of the City.

Oklahoma Highway System Nearly \$8 billion in upgrades heading to Oklahoma!

Thanks to an influx of federal grants and additional state funding, the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) is maximizing new dollars to plan for more than 1,600 critically needed highway construction and safety projects in the next eight years.

With more than 300 new projects added to the Eight-Year Construction 2022-2029 Plan for approved on Monday, October 4th, the department will commit an additional nearly \$2 billion into highway infrastructure and the state's economy. This brings a total impact of nearly \$8 billion by the end of the decade. Commissioners also approved a \$484 million investment in preventative maintenance through the companion Asset Preservation Plan for 2022-2025

With the restoration of \$180 million in state appropriated funding and an anticipated 2023 increase in the Rebuilding Oklahoma Access and Driver Safety (ROADS) Fund annual cap from \$575 million to \$590 million, ODOT was able to budget for more critically needed projects in this plan update.

Additionally, Oklahoma is one of the first states to take advantage of the federal Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA) Rural Project Initiative at the U.S. Department of Transportation to accelerate rural, two-lane improvement projects already in the Eight-Year Plan. Use of low-interest TIFIA loans helps increase funding for Oklahoma to add more projects into the plan.

FFY 2022-2029 Eight-Year Construction Work Plan:

- Nearly \$8 billion in total investment
- 1,657 total projects

• Addresses 685 bridges through rehabilitation or replacement, including the last few remaining structurally deficient bridges

• Nearly 2,296 miles of roadway improvements, which includes more than 1,013 miles of safety improvements on two-lane highways with deficient or no shoulders.
