Animal Cruelty Prevention Month



Preventing animal cruelty starts with responsible pet ownership. The month of April is Animal Cruelty Prevention Month. Cruelty may include but not limited to animal *neglect* of

unreasonable deprivation of necessary food, care or shelter or inhumane treatment includes, but is not limited to, the following:
Any physical punishment inconsistent with the health of such animal;

 Lack of food or water for more than a twenty-four (24) hour period; Knowingly permitting obvious nutritional deficiencies or other evident

health problems involving any animal;

• Improper use of any collar or harness or a fixed leash for the purpose of

confining any animal which results in flesh laceration, obvious pain or to cause choking to such animal;

Depriving animal of adequate shelter; and

• Inhumane killing or attempting to kill any animal.

You can report instances of animal cruelty to the City of Blanchard to be investigated by calling 485-9392.

Easter Sunday



Many Christians celebrate Easter Sunday as the day of Jesus Christ's resurrection, which is

written in the New Testament of the Christian bible. According to the Gospel of John in the New Testament, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb where Jesus was buried and found it empty. An angel told her that Jesus had risen. Christians worldwide have celebrated Easter for centuries.

However, the roots of the Easter holiday's traditions and activities can be traced back to pagan celebrations. The name Easter is believed to come from *Eostara*, the goddess of rebirth. In early times the Feast of Eostara celebrated earth's resurrection and rebirth. Strict Puritans would have nothing to do with Easter – it was merely a human institution – in the past. Charles I, king of England, declared the day as scriptural as Sunday in 1647 but Parliament contradicted him in print and abolished it with other church festivals.

The Easter date depends on the ecclesiastical approximation of the March equinox. In 325CE the Council of Nicaea decided that the Easter date would be the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the March equinox. Easter is therefore delayed one week if the full moon is on Sunday, which lessens the likelihood of it falling on the same day as the Jewish Passover. Eastern Orthodox churches in many countries such as Greece still figure their Easter date based on the Julian calendar.

Easter eggs and the Easter Bunny are both fertility symbols, holdovers from the feast of Eostara. Other symbolic parallels include the pagan joy in the rising sun of spring, which coincides with Christians' joy in the rising Son of God, and the lighting of candles in churches, which corresponds to the pagan bonfires. The symbol of the cross and images of Jesus Christ, through paintings or statues, are remembered on Easter Day which is Sunday, April 17th.

Oil 'n Gas

The Oklahoma Corporation Commission reported since April 1st that NO oil or gas wells were completed or permitted within the municipal limits of the City.

OKC Water Rates

The Oklahoma City Council is considering a recommendation from the Oklahoma City Water Utilities Trust (OCWUT) to adjust annual water, wastewater, and solid waste rates. If approved, the new rates will take effect June 1, 2022. These rate increase will range from 2.45% in 2022 to 2.71% in 2026 for low volumn users up to 2,000 gallons per month. Heavy users will experience higher rate increase beginning with over 6% increase in 2022.

The funds would ensure adequate water supply through 2060, replace aging infrastructure for drinking water and wastewater, improve system reliability and resiliency, and build reserves to help fund residential debris pick up after storms.

Utilities staff presented the rate adjustment proposal to City Council on March 29th after conducting a cost-ofservice study with an outside consultant. A public hearing is scheduled for April 12th, and a vote is set for April 26th.

If approved, these new water rates <u>ONLY</u> will affect Blanchard residents, since we receive 100% of our water from the City of OKC.

Shelter Registration

The Blanchard Emergency Management wants to remind everyone that severe storm season is fast approaching. We express how important it is for everyone to register their home's storm shelters and safe rooms. The City of Blanchard storm shelter registry provides emergency services with information that allows them to locate citizens after a tornado or other natural disaster. Registration helps ensure that people in shelters affected by the storm are able to get help guickly with the potential of shelters' exits being blocked due to debris or structural damage. Registration is doubly important with the possibility of shelters flooding due to broken water lines or simply rain waters entering the shelter and drowning people trapped inside. Registration forms include your address, list of persons who would normally be present at the home and could potentially be in the shelter, the

location of the shelter/safe room on the property, and contact information for yourself and an emergency contact. If you have previously registered and some part of your information has changed, feel free to submit an updated form. If you have a question as to if your shelter is registered please contact the Emergency Management Director/Fire Chief Charlie Largent at the Blanchard Fire Department at 405.485.3939.
