CDBG Project

The City held a pre-construction meeting Thursday morning. The contractor (Orr Construction) plans to begin the water project on Tuesday, June 28th. They estimate to complete the construction by October 21st.

Phase 1 will begin with the replacement of water lines in old Town Blanchard that are less than six (6) inches in diameter.

Like Mother's Day, Father's Day has a modern origin. The idea came to Mrs. John Dodd as she sat listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909. Her father, William Smart, had raised his children alone on his Washington farm after his wife died giving birth to their sixth child. Mrs. Dodd proposed to the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA that they celebrate a "father's day" on June 5, her father's birthday. The idea received strong support, but the good ministers of Spokane asked that the day be changed to give them extra time to prepare sermons on the unexplored subject of fathers. The first Father's Day was observed on June 19, 1910, in Spokane, Washington, and soon other towns had their own celebrations. In spite of widespread support, Father's Day did not become a permanent national holiday until 1972, when President Richard Nixon signed a law declaring that it be celebrated annually on the third Sunday in June (16th).

Fight the Bite!

These insects kill more people in 1 day than sharks do in a century!

Individuals can reduce their risk of contracting mosquito-



borne diseases, such as the West Nile virus, by getting rid of standing water around houses and by using insect repellant. Here is a simple way to remember how to "Fight the Bite" using mosquito safety. Just remember 3 D's and a P!

- DRAIN stagnant water;
- DRESS wear long sleeves and pants;
- DEET repel when you're outside;
- PREVENT reduce your exposure.

Unfortunately, there is no easy solution for managing mosquitoes. Countless products on the market claim to be effective and easy to use but few have appreciable value in lessening the annoyance and incidence of bites. Unlike most insects found around homes, mosquitoes are pervasive outdoor pests and there are limits to what can be done to minimize their abundance, Nonetheless, there are measures that can afford some relief.

Food Trucks

Franchise Election

Letter from AEP/PSO. If you are a registered voter living within the city limits of Blanchard, then you are eligible to vote on the renewal of the PSO electric franchise. The election will be held from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 28th, at your normal polling place.

The PSO electric franchise allows PSO to use City streets and alleys to provide electric service to Blanchard. The franchise also enables PSO to make new capital investments in their electric system while maintaining their existing facilities in Blanchard.

In return for this access, PSO collects for, and remits to the City a monthly franchise fee that in the last twelve (12) months totaled \$75,404.31. The City also saves more than \$22,164.24 annually on municipal street lighting costs through a special lighting program available only to those communities having a PSO electric franchise.

In addition to the franchise-related financial aspects, PSO continues to invest in Blanchard. They have invested in tree management and upgrading their electric system to expand the opportunity for growth, improve the reliability of their electric service in Blanchard and the surrounding area, and mitigate the potential damage from ice and wind. PSO remitted \$137,227.32 in sales tax for the City and paid more than \$96,954.00 in McClain County and \$1,073,109.98 in Grady County in property tax.

PSO currently offers free home weatherization to eligible customers in Blanchard.

PSO is proud to have provided electricity to Blanchard and with your positive vote, they look forward to doing so for many years to come.

The potential loss of these funds to the City is equivalent to 4.25 police officer positions or 4.19 firefighter positions.

Summer Solstice

The summer solstice heralds the beginning of summer! The timing of the summer solstice depends on when the Sun reaches its farthest point north of the equator. This occurs annually sometime between June 20 and 22, depending on the time zone. This year, the



event occurs at 4:13am (CDT) on Tuesday, June 21st.

The word solstice is from the Latin solstitium, from sol (sun) and stitium (to stop), reflecting the fact that the Sun appears to stop at this time (and again at the winter solstice). In

temperate regions, we notice that the Sun is higher in the sky throughout the day, and its rays strike Earth at a more direct angle, causing the efficient warming we call summer. In the winter, just the opposite occurs: The Sun is at its southernmost point and is low in the sky. Its rays hit the Northern Hemisphere at an oblique angle, creating the feeble winter sunlight.

Watering Odd-Even



Oklahoma City's odd-even watering rotations permanent and has been in place since 2013. It eases the summer-time demand on their water treatment system. These restrictions apply to Blanchard residents since we receive one-hundred

(100) percent of our water from OKC. Addresses ending in a 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8, can water on any day that ends in an even number. Addresses ending in a 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9 can water on any day ending in an odd number. Most Oklahoma lawns don't need more than one (1) inch of water per week in the summer to maintain optimum health. Use a rain gauge to determine how much water your lawn is getting. Fewer, deeper watering ensures better root health. Visit www.squeezeeverydrop.com for details.
