who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revised in 1907, when William Willett, an Englishman, proposed a similar EVENTS system in the pamphlet 'The Waste of Daylight'.

The Germans were the first to officially adopt the lightextending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War 1. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when Congress passed the Standard Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers [cows don't pay attention to clocks]. During World War II, Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again [this time year around] to save fuel.

SO REMEMBER! When you change the clocks, change your batteries in your smoke and CO² detectors.



Road Projects

The City Council awarded the contract for section line road improvements to Haskell Lemon Construction in the total amount of \$7,158,655.00. The project for Phase I includes the rebuilding and paving of approximately 6.77 miles of the following section line roads:

- 3.68 miles of South County Line Road from U.S. 62 south to 250th:
- 1.59 miles of Morgan Road from U.S. 62 north to 10^{th} Street NW:
- 1.0 mile of County Line Road from 10^{th} Street NW north to 25^{th} ; and
- 0.5 miles of 55^{th} Street from O.K. 76 east to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile.

However, Haskell Lemon has to wrap up a project for ODOT (OK-37) before starting on Phase I beginning the first week of November.

The sales tax approved by voters at a special election on February 8^{th} took effect July 1^{st} with the first collections in September.

The following chart tracks the one penny sales/use tax earmarked for section line road improvements:

Shop Local

Here's what happens when you "shop local."
