### Daylite Saving Time Ends



FALL BACK SUNDAY, November 6<sup>th</sup>, when Daylight Saving Time ends at 2 a.m. Clocks will "fall back" one-hour.

Credit for Daylite Saving Time belongs to Benjamin Franklin, who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revised in 1907, when William Willett, an Englishman, proposed a similar system in the pamphlet 'The Waste of Daylight'.

The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War 1. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when Congress passed the Standard Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers [cows don't pay attention to clocks]. During World War II, Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again [this time year around] to save fuel.

SO REMEMBER! When you change the clocks, change your batteries in your smoke and  $CO^2$  detectors.

### Parade Marshal



The Blanchard American Legion and VFW posts have chosen Stan Adams of Blanchard to be the Grand Marshal of the annual Veterans Day Parade on Saturday, November 12<sup>th</sup>.

Stan is a Korean War Navy veteran. Both his father and brother were also Navy veterans. Because Stan was just 17 years old when he joined the Navy, his father had to give his permission.

Stan was assigned a Submarine Chaser, a small but very fast anti-submarine warfare vessel. Two other benefits of his USN service were seeing the world and providing financial assistance to his family back home. He served a total of four (4) years before mustering out and returning home to Oklahoma City.

Stan married Marlene Moore just two (2) weeks before she graduated from high school. They have lived in Blanchard since the 1960s. They have two (2) children, a son (Michael) and a daughter (Carolyn Sill), who both graduated from Blanchard High School in the late 60s.

Stan and Marlene have five (5) grandchildren and seven (7) great grandchildren. Stan was an avid golfer and loved working on old cars, and the whole family loved to snow ski. Stan and Marlene have been long-time members of the First United Methodist Church in Blanchard.

# S hop Local
