

Public Hearing

The Blanchard City Council will conduct a public hearing at their regular meeting on Tuesday, December 13Th beginning at 6pm. The purpose of the hearing is to solicit public input regarding an application to the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation to fund certain park improvements.

The proposed application is seeking an 80-20 grant to fund approximately 5,280 L.F. of walking trails and pedestrian bridges serving Crystal Lake Park linking to Southpark. This proposal is the second of a multi-phase project of a Blanchard Master Plan for park improvements connecting city parks to

other parks, public schools, library, downtown and post office.

All interested parties are encouraged to attend said hearings.

Shop Local

Here's what happens when you "shop local."

1. More of your money will be kept in the Blanchard local economy: For every \$100 you spend at locally owned businesses, \$68 stays in Blanchard. What happens when you spend that same \$100 at a national chain? Only \$43 stays in the community*.

- 7. You create more choice: Locally owned businesses pick the items and products they sell bases on what they know you like and want. Local businesses carry a wider array of unique products because they buy for their own individual markets.
- 8. You take advantage of their expertise: You are their friends and neighbors, and locally owned businesses have a vested interest in knowing how to serve you. They're passionate about what they do. Why not take advantage of it?
- 9. You invested in entrepreneurship: Creativity and entrepreneurship are what the American economy is founded upon. Nurturing local business ensures a strong community.

Thanksgiving



Our modern Turkey Day has its origins in two very different holidays; the harvest home feast and the formal day of thanksgiving proclaimed by church or government authorities in gratitude for a particular event, such as a military victory. Very few days of thanksgiving coincided with harvest celebrations. Thanksgiving Day began in Plymouth Colony in 1621, when the Pilgrims gave thanks for their survival and crops.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln set aside the last Thursday in November for a national celebration of Thanksgiving. (In 1941, the U.S. Congress decreed that Thanksgiving shall fall on the fourth Thursday of November).



that the Sun is at its farthest point from the equator and appears to stand still. It occurs on Wednesday, December 21st at 3:48 p.m. CST.

The word solstice is derived from the Latin sol, or "Sun," and stitium, or "stoppage." The Halcyon Days also occur around this time. According to ancient legend, a grieving wife named Alcyone, or Halcyon, threw herself into the sea upon discovering the drowned body of her beloved husband, Ceyx. The gods took pity on the pair, transforming them into kingfishers with the power to still the stormy seas for 14 days around the time of the winter solstice while they built their nest and hatched their young.
