News Release

With reliable high-speed internet service and billions of dollars on the line, every Oklahoman is strongly encouraged to check their addresses for current service availability on a newly released map by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), the Oklahoma Broadband Office announced today.

The map, available at https://broadbandmap.fcc.gov/home, allows visitors to look up their addresses and check to see if the information provided is accurate. If not, visitors can provide corrected information by clicking the Availability Challenge link.

Any Oklahoman, business, school, church, library, or place with internet service can look at the map and challenge the information.

The request to check the map is urgent. The FCC has set a deadline of January 13, 2023, to provide correct information.

- 5. You nurture community: Local business owners know you, and you know them. Studies have shown that local businesses donate to community causes at more than twice the rate of chains.
- You conserve your tax dollars: Shopping in a local business district means less infrastructure. less maintenance, and more money available to beautify the community. Also, spending locally instead of online ensures that your sales taxes are reinvested where they belong - in Blanchard.
- 7. You create more choice: Locally owned businesses pick the items and products they sell bases on what they know you like and want. Local businesses carry a wider array of unique products because they buy for their own individual markets.



Simultaneously to the public challenge process, the office, Native American tribes, and other internet-related groups are scouring the map data and will challenge any erroneous entries they find.

Oklahoma policymakers are focused on expanding and enhancing high-speed internet due to its many economic, health, and public safety benefits. The broadband office is regularly updating its website at broadband.ok.gov with the most recent information.

About the Oklahoma Broadband Office. Oklahoma launched an aggressive effort to ensure fast and affordable broadband internet service is available throughout the state and the Oklahoma Broadband Office is a key component.

Created by the Legislature in May 2022, the office is on a five-year mission to develop and administer grant programs to make affordable, high-speed internet available to all Oklahomans. It also coordinates efforts throughout the state to ensure broadband expansion is conducted effectively and efficiently.

Road Improvements

The Haskell Lemon Group (Contractor) began section line road improvements on Monday (December 5^{th}).



County Line Road between 10th Street NW for one-mile to 25th Street NW is the first road segment to be repaired and paved.

Please avoid this area due to construction! If you need to visit the Blanchard High School campus, please use Paulk Drive to access the school.

Phase I improvements total \$7,158,655 and will include South County Line Road from 250^{th} North to OK-76; Morgan Road from US-62 to 25^{th} Street NW, County Line Road between 10^{th} Street NW to 25^{th} Street NW and 55^{th} Street NE from OK-76 east for one-half mile.

Winter Solstice



The winter solstice is one of the two times each year that the Sun is at its farthest point from the equator and appears to stand still. It occurs on Wednesday, December 21st at 3:48 p.m. CST.

The word solstice is derived from the Latin sol, or "Sun," and stitium, or "stoppage." The Halcyon Days also occur around this time. According to ancient legend, a grieving wife named Alcyone, or Halcyon, threw herself into the sea upon

discovering the drowned body of her beloved husband, Ceyx. The gods took pity on the pair, transforming them into kingfishers with the power to still the stormy seas for 14 days



around the time of the winter solstice while they built their nest and hatched their young.
