Appeal of the BOA Decision

A Notice of Appeal has been filed in the Blanchard Board of Adjustment case denying a variance sought by Richardson's Homes to meet a rear yard setback of 9 feet to the property line located at 838 Windmill Avenue (Silo Acres).

The appeal will be heard and tried de novo in McClain County District Court.

The district court may reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or modify the decision brought up for review. Costs shall not be allowed against the board of adjustment unless it shall appear to the district court that the board acted with gross negligence or in bad faith or with malice in making the decision appealed from.

BMIA Action

• Discussed and voted to exempt water line extension to serve a proposed short form subdivision (lot splits) of 20 acres located north of 3rd Street SW and east of Morgan Road, Grady County.

 Clear all obstructions (hanging plants, bushes, flags, etc.) from blocking your house number;

Post large numbers to allow visibility from the street;

 Place your numbers near the street or on the curb, with a reflective coating and contrasting background;

• Allow numbers to be seen from all directions (if your home is on a corner, have numbers posted on all sides).

The BMC §4-402 requires all building and houses to be numbered. The even numbers (2,4,6, etc.) shall be on the east side of the streets extending north and south, and on the south side of the streets extending east and west; the odd numbers (1,3,5, etc.) shall be on the opposite side of streets.

Special Meeting

• Discuss and possible action to increase the utility rates for water/sewer/sanitation services due to increases with the cost of services from water providers (OKCWUT and the City of Newcastle), sewer treatment costs and compliance with ODEQ Consent Order, and sold waste collection (Waste Connections). Action by the BMIA may include the adoption of a Resolution addressing utility fee increases and action by the City of Blanchard may include the adoption and/or an Ordinance changing utility rates, as desired.

Water Restrictions

The City of Oklahoma City is still experiencing low water pressure issues in providing water across the river which results in lower pressure for Blanchard, Cole and Dibble customers.

As a result, outside watering restrictions are in place and **PROHIBITED** until either the issue is resolved by OKC or temperatures fall into the high eighties or low nineties.

If the Planning Commission's recommendation is in favor of approving the rezoning request, at which time an Ordinance amending the Zoning Map may be considered and voted upon.
