

F.O.G.

The holiday season is upon us, with lots of delicious holiday meals filled with fats, oils and grease, known as FOG.

The City reminds residents to "prevent clogs" do NOT toss these fats, oils and grease down the drain. If tossed down the sink, FOG can clog sewer lines and cause costly repairs not only to the homeowner, but to the City as well.

To prevent clogs, pour your liquid fats, oil and grease such as turkey grease, gravy, cooking oil or melted butter into a lid container, place it in the freezer until it becomes solid. You can safely toss the container in the trash.

House Numbering

In an emergency, first responders (fire, police and ambulance) and utility service technicians depend on clearly marked addresses to find the right home as quickly as possible. Finding a residence can be challenging if street addresses (house numbers) are unreadable, hidden, unlit or missing. You can help emergency responders and service technicians locate your home by following these tips:

- ^o Replace aging or faded numbers;
- Clear all obstructions (hanging plants, bushes, flags, etc.) from blocking your house number;
- Post large numbers to allow visibility from the street;

• Place your numbers near the street or on the curb, with a reflective coating and contrasting background;

• Allow numbers to be seen from all directions (if your home is on a corner, have numbers posted on all sides).

The BMC §4-402 requires all building and houses to be numbered. The even numbers (2,4,6, etc.) shall be on the east side of the streets extending north and south, and on the south side of the streets extending east and west; the odd numbers (1,3,5, etc.) shall be on the opposite side of streets.

The Blanchard Senior Nutrition Center serves a fully balanced lunch (entrees, sides, desserts, tea and coffee) for all senior citizens five (5) days a week beginning at 11:30am, Monday thru Friday (except City Observed Holiday.

Winter Solstice



The winter solstice is one of the two times each year that the Sun is at its farthest point from the equator and appears to stand still. It occurs on Wednesday, December 21st at 9:27 p.m. CST.

The word solstice is derived from the Latin sol, or "Sun,"and stitium, or "stoppage." The Halcyon Days also occur around this time. According to ancient legend, a grieving wife named Alcyone, or Halcyon, threw herself into the sea upon discovering the drowned body of her beloved husband, Ceyx. The gods took pity on the pair, transforming them into kingfishers with the power to still the stormy seas for 14 days around the time of the winter solstice while they built their nest and hatched their young.
